

#### **FOREWORD**

Chief Justice Harvey has reappointed as members of the Judicial Council, Honorable Edgar C. Bennett, James E. Taylor and Randal C. Harvey, for terms expiring June 1, 1949.

The Judicial Council held a called meeting on June 9, 1945, to survey work to be done in the future. The Council is intending to do some research with a view to restating of a part of our crimes act and to determining whether a revision of the code of civil procedure before justices of the peace is necessary.

The work in connection with the crimes act has been suggested from a number of sources. The proposal that we revise the justice code arises from the fact that it is applicable in the various city and county courts and it has been suggested that in part it is not entirely fitted to those courts.

In connection with the above research the Council is interested in getting in communication with lawyers who may have time to devote to either of the above proposals. A modest compensation can be paid for work done. Preference will be given to some lawyer who has served in the armed forces of the United States and who has been discharged. If you are interested personally or know of any lawyer who might be, kindly write the Judicial Council, State House, Topeka.

At its session on June 6, 1945, the Supreme Court held memorial services for two former members. A memorial for the late Chief Justice Rousseau A. Burch was prepared and presented by Justice Walter G. Thiele, and a memorial for Justice Richard J. Hopkins was prepared and presented by Justice William A. Smith. Both memorials are printed in this issue of the BULLETIN of October, 1936, and a photograph of Justice Hopkins was the frontispiece of the BULLETIN of October, 1943.

For some time the Judicial Council has collected and printed lists of Kansas lawyers in the military, naval or marine service of the United States. These lists have been completely revised and in this issue is the list as it now stands. It shows those lawyers who have been discharged or are listed as missing or prisoners or as deceased. Separately we have printed short biographies of those who died in service or as the result of service.

This list is prepared from many questionnaires sent out to judges, lawyers and clerks of court and each of them the Judicial Council thanks for his cooperation. We have endeavored to have the lists and memorials complete and accurate. If there is any omission or error we will appreciate having our attention called to it so that corrections may be made in future lists.

# ROUSSEAU ANGELUS BURCH

We pause today to pay respect to the memory of Rousseau Angelus Burch, for almost thirty-five years a member of this court.

R. A. Burch, as he was more usually known, was born August 4, 1862, in Warren county, Indiana, and died January 29, 1944, at his home in Topeka, Kan. As a child he came to Kansas with his parents in 1869. He attended the public schools and was graduated from the Salina high school in 1879. After teaching school in Kansas for three years, he attended college in Valparaiso, Indiana, for a time and in 1883 entered the Law School of Michigan University, from which he was graduated in 1885. In 1924 the University of Michigan conferred a degree of LL.D. upon him and in 1929 Washburn College honored him by conferring the degree of Litt. D. He was admitted to the bar in Saline county, Kansas, commenced the practice of law at Salina and continued there until his appointment as a Justice of the Supreme Court by Governor Stanley on September 29, 1902. He served as a Justice until the retirement of Chief Justice Johnston on July 1, 1935, and served as Chief Justice until January 11, 1937. His tenure on the court has been exceeded only by that of Chief Justice Johnston. Such is only a very brief sketch of his early life prior to his admission to the bar and of his attainments thereafter.

Of his family life, it may be said that in 1889 he was married to Clara Teague, who died in 1928. They were the parents of two children, a daughter now deceased, and a son, Angelus Teague Burch, now the associate editor of the Cleveland *Press*, of Cleveland, Ohio.

Justice Porter, in speaking on the life of Justice Benson, said: "It is a common saying that no man is ever as good as the eulogy written by his friends would have you believe," and it might well be added that none is quite as bad as his critics would paint him. Those who came to know Justice Burch well know that while he was brusque in manner, and impatient with those pretending learning they did not possess, he was a highly educated, cultured gentleman who listened to the problems which others found difficult, and gave generously of his own time and ability in order that a proper solution might be reached. He was an inspiring man with whom to work and be associated.

Chief Justice Burch was always a student. He started in life as a student and continued one to the end of his life. He spent a number of summers as a teacher in the Law School of Northwestern University, and after his retirement from this court he became Dean of the Law School of Washburn University, where he continued until compelled to retire by reason of his ill health. He wrote a good many articles on legal subjects and many of these appeared in legal periodicals and journals.

He took a great interest in the American Law Institute and was a member and active in its work from its beginning in 1923. He was for many years a member of the Council of the Institute, and continued so until he was compelled to retire in 1942. At the meeting in 1944 when the work of the Restatement was finally closed, the director, Dr. William Draper Lewis, was called upon to summarize the work and those engaged therein, and in the course of his remarks paid a special tribute to the work done by Chief Justice Burch, calling attention to the fact that he always came to meetings of the Institute and its Council thoroughly prepared and advised as to the matters in hand and that he always contributed effectively to the work done.

In the course of his career on this court as Justice and Chief Justice he wrote over 1,900 formal opinions, covering all phases of the law. His opinions as a justice may be found in the Kansas Reports, Volumes 65 to 142, both inclusive, and as Chief Justice in Volumes 142 to 145, both inclusive. Many of these opinions attracted wide attention. Whether he considered that any particular ones were more noteworthy than others is not known. He had not been on the court a great while until he wrote the opinion in Cross v. Benson, 68 Kan. 495, dealing with our homestead law. His comments on the family and the purpose of the homestead provision are classic, and the case has been cited and followed on many occasions. His statement of the duties and obligations of a county attorney in State v. Trinkle, 70 Kan. 396, is a model for clarity of statement and of incisive use of language. Coleman v. MacLennan, 78 Kan. 711, in which he wrote the opinion, is a leading case in the law of libel and slander. Although written in 1908, the principles laid down in the case are often noted and the case is frequently cited. Another opinion written by Justice Burch which is found in many casebooks and textbooks dealing with wills and administrations is Ginter v. Ginter, 79 Kan. 721, where the law with reference to fraud and undue influence in the making of a will is clearly and thoroughly set forth.

In 1903 our legislature adopted what is known as the factory act in which, among other things, provision was made for safeguarding machinery in manufacturing establishments. The constitutionality of this act came before the court in Caspar v. Lewin, 72 Kan. 604, and in an opinion written by Justice Burch constitutionality was upheld. In that opinion a thorough review was made of the common law formerly applicable to such institutions, and the purposes of remedial legislation. In the course of the opinion appears the following:

"It may be said that the letter of a statute should not prevail over its sense and spirit, that a literal interpretation rewards carelessness, and that the act ought to be construed in connection with the settled maxims and principles of the common law. . . But what is the spirit of this statute? It is to stop the insufferable waste of human life and limb which has been the universal accompaniment of the conduct of manufacturing industries. The law is a police regulation, adopted to reform the inhumanity of factory methods and to prevent the casting into the world of dependent cripples and widows and orphans left without means of support. This purpose includes the reduction of the number of casualties to the careless as well as to the prudent. If the prescribed precautions be taken and the required safeguards be installed, killing and maining will cease, or at least will be reduced to a minimum."

The language above quoted was often repeated in the literature of that time dealing with factory legislation.

The above opinions were written in his early years on the court. His later opinions showed the same care in preparation, the same thoroughness, and a logical treatment of the subject under discussion. Whether a reader agreed

with the conclusion reached or not, he always appreciated that the point in-

volved had been fully considered.

Illustrative of these characteristics are three cases. In Boyer v. Hail Insurance Co., 86 Kan. 442, the question was the liability of the company where its agent failed to forward promptly an application for insurance and a loss occurred before the policy had been issued and delivered. In McCartney v. Robbins, 114 Kan. 141, the question was the validity of the mortgage given by a life tenant and his wife, who took a contingent remainder. The opinion is a model for treatment of the subject matter, for conciseness of statement, and for exposition of the applicable law. The last case is one of Justice Burch's later opinions, Bates v. State Savings Bank, 136 Kan. 767, which involved the right of a surviving wife, where the husband alone had executed a fifteen year lease on real estate and had died before the term expired. The opinion contains a very instructive discussion of our law of descents and distributions, and again illustrates thorough study of the case and intensive preparation of the opinion.

In October, 1936, the then Chief Justice Burch wrote an article for the Judicial Council Bulletin entitled "The Law's Delay in the Supreme Court." In a foreword our present Chief Justice Harvey said concerning Chief Justice

Burch:

"His love for the law and its application to human activity, his alert, masterful mentality, and his great industry, have made him one of the outstanding jurists of our day. His ardent study of literature is reflected in his opinions. He never strove to be rich, but rather to perform well the work assigned to him."

About the same time the above was written, Dean John H. Wigmore stated that he considered Chief Justice Burch one of the five best writers of legal

opinions in the United States.

Justice Burch was a great reader and lover of fine literature. He was especially fond of the poet Robert Browning, and his address before the Kansas Authors Club in 1936 on the life and work of Browning received wide atten-

tion among those interested in literary pursuits.

Those closely associated with Chief Justice Burch were well aware that he had a brilliant mind, was a thorough student and wrote in a trenchant style which attracted attention and appealed to his readers. No justice of this court has had a wider reputation with the bench and bar of the United States. His service on this court over a long period of years reflected credit upon himself, upon the court, and upon the state.

#### JUSTICE RICHARD J. HOPKINS

When one who has been a member of this court is called by death custom decrees that one of his brothers on the bench shall make note of his passing.

Perhaps it is fitting that to the writer should fall the duty and privilege of setting down the record of Richard J. Hopkins, a former justice of this court. I say perhaps it is fitting because the writer knew him as a close personal friend; worked with him in politics; practiced with him as a lawyer and before him after he became a justice; was in his home many times and knew his family intimately. A boyish admiration grew into deep affection and ripened into a profund respect for the man, the jurist and the loyal friend.

Richard J. Hopkins was born in Jefferson City, Missouri, in 1873, the son of W. R. and Elizabeth Murphy Hopkins. We first find him in Kansas in a two-room sod house with his father and mother and three brothers and sisters. It has been said that the family located in Garden City, Finney county. The fact is, however, it was not Finney county then. It was Sequoyah county. The town was not Garden City. It was Sherlock, later to be called Holcomb. At any rate, W. R. Hopkins and his wife had moved to that place in 1879. A lawyer, W. R. Hopkins entered in the practice in his new home. He was a veteran of the civil war and had come to western Kansas with his young wife to find a better opportunity for their children. Law business was not plentiful, however, and the family income had to be supplemented by the operation of a farm near Sherlock with the production of garden truck, meat, eggs and butter. It is to the operation of this farm and the early struggles attendant thereto that Richard J. Hopkins was indebted for the attitude evinced later in life toward the welfare of the little people, those inarticulate members of our society who are so often found without an advocate.

A great impetus to the fortunes of the family came after six years of struggle at Sherlock. Finney county was organized. Garden City was made the county seat and W. R. Hopkins was elected the first county attorney.

Richard J. Hopkins was graduated from high school at Garden City, and after teaching a district school for one year he entered the state university in the fall of 1893 as a special student. He joined the Sigma Nu Fraternity and became active in college politics. In the spring of 1895 he won the college oratorical contest. He worked as a janitor at the Unitarian Church, agent for a laundry, secretary of a boarding club and paid his way by many other ingenious devices. In 1899 he entered the law school at Northwestern University at Chicago. He received his LL B. degree there in 1901. He was admitted to the bar of Illinois.

For a while he engaged in the practice of law in Chicago. The call of his beloved western Kansas, however, was too great for him to resist. In 1906 he returned to Garden City and continued until the day of his father's death in the practice of his profession with his father. The relationship was a happy one from the beginning, until his father's death.

Richard J. Hopkins early felt the urge to take part in civic affairs. In 1908

he was elected to the state legislature from Finney county. On his arrival at Topeka he threw his political destinies in with a group which was to be known as the Boss Busters. He was elected speaker pro tem of the house even though this was his first term. J. N. Dolley was elected speaker. He served in that session with distinction to himself and profit to the state.

In 1910 politics again beckoned him. This time he took a more prominent part on the stage of state politics. He was nominated and elected lieutenant governor. For the first time in the history of our state as far as is recorded the members of the senate deprived the lieutenant governor of the prerogative of naming the committees of the senate. In this situation fraught with elements which might have resulted in unhappiness for all parties and hampered the real work of the senate Richard J. Hopkins displayed a quality of character that was to become more and more effective as he went forward in his public life. When that session was finished the senators in a general symposium went at great length to speak of the fair, impartial and efficient manner in which he had presided over the affairs of that body for the session. They presented the young lieutenant governor with a gold watch as a testimonial of the high regard in which they held him. On this occasion a leader of the group which had taken the committee-appointing power away from Hopkins, said: "I have been in touch with this senate for many years, but I know of no presiding officer during that period who has excelled Lieutenant Governor Hopkins in fairness or parliamentary knowledge, or in capacity expeditiously to conduct the business of this body."

Richard J. Hopkins was not a candidate for lieutenant governor in 1912. He thought his best opportunity to be of service to the state lay in another direction. He was a candidate for the nomination for congress in the seventh district. The upheaval due to the defection in Republican ranks on account of the differences between Roosevelt and Taft was making itself felt at the time. Hopkins cast his lot with the progressive wing and lost the nomination by about three hundred votes.

After this he followed the practice of law, during which time he served as city attorney of Garden City for six years. In 1918 he was nominated and elected attorney general of the state. While in that office he devoted the force of that office toward the law enforcement generally. An ardent prohibitionist and personal dry himself, he made the enforcement of those laws a creed during the four years in that office. He also carried on the prosecution of various defendants charged with violation of the antitrust laws. He not only devoted his official energy to the enforcement of the dry laws but spent considerable time in speaking before various bodies on the question of personal temperance as well. He also took the stand that real prohibition could only be had through teaching the lessons of temperance by means of precept and example to the adolescents just coming on the stage. He emphasized the value of the church and school and family working to the end that obedience to law should become a creed and law enforcement successful.

At the end of four years as attorney general he was nominated and elected to the supreme court of the state. He assumed that position in 1923. His name first appears in the reports of this court in Volume III. His last participation in the work of the court appears in Volume 129. These years cover the time in our state's history that the work of the supreme court was very

heavy. It was not unusual for each justice to have six or seven opinions to write each month. To his work on the court Richard J. Hopkins brought his wide knowledge of governmental affairs gained in his experience as city attorney, in the legislature and as lieutenant governor and attorney general. He always approached the problem from the viewpoint of the public good. His early training on the farm and in the university and law school gained him a rare insight into the motives that prompt man's actions. During these years Kansas was taking the lead in writing into its judicial decisions the philosophy that the public good demands the enforcement of the law and that the individual's rights may be protected without any sacrifice of constitutional guaranties. He had the rare ability to give proper heed to his brothers on the bench, coupled with matchless courage when once he had reached the conclusion that his position was the correct one.

On December 27, 1929, he resigned from this court to accept the appointment as United States district judge for the district of Kansas.

The federal court docket in Kansas when he was appointed was long, containing many cases which had been pending for years. He worked hard and steadfastly to bring this docket up to date. He disliked delay and procrastinations, being convinced that justice delayed is often justice denied.

He was determined to keep down unnecessary expenditure of the government's money. Juries were not called until they were needed and they were dismissed when they were not needed. Cases were not continued without substantial reason. Attorneys were encouraged to come quickly to the point and not drag their cases. The docket was kept cleared.

His work on the federal court was such as to cause him to be sent to New York on one occasion to preside over the trial of one Jack (Legs) Diamond, a gangster who was accused of a liquor conspiracy. While in New York he startled some New Yorkers by his frank manner of speaking of the attitude of the people of New York toward law enforcement generally.

Hopkins married May Cathcart, of Garden City, September 16, 1909. Three children were born of this marriage. Mrs. Hopkins died of the flu in 1918. The eldest son, Lt. Col. Richard C. Hopkins, having been graduated from West Point, died at Camp Gordon, Georgia, on February 8, 1940. His only daughter, Isabelle, now Mrs. Henry Martz, is living with her lawyer husband at Wichita, Kansas. Daniel R., their youngest son, is a Major in the army, now stationed in the Philippines.

He married Miss Lida Hafford, of Carrollton, Kentucky, January 22, 1935. At the time of his death his home was at 1501 West 59th Street in Johnson county, Kansas. He was survived by his wife, by his daughter, Mrs. Henry Martz, and her children, Richard Hopkins, Henry Ellsworth and Mary Ellen, by Daniel and his son, Robert Murray, and by Susan Ann and Richard Edwin Hopkins, the children of Richard C. Hopkins, his son.

He died on August 28, 1943, in his chambers at Kansas City at the age of seventy. At the time of his death he was engaged in the trial of an action that involved the OPA. His death came, as he no doubt would have wished it, while he was busy in his chosen career as jurist.

# KANSAS LAWYERS WHO HAVE DIED IN MILITARY SERVICE

#### HARRY AKERS

Staff Sergeant Harry Akers of Coffeyville, radio operator and waist gunner on a B-26, was killed in a plane crash March 15, 1944, at Marrakech, French Morocco, in North Africa. Sergeant Akers entered military service in January, 1943, and attended gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev., and radio school at Sioux Falls, S. Dak. He was at Barksdale Field, La., prior to receiving his overseas assignment.

Born September 24, 1911, near Dearing, Sergeant Akers received his early education in the Coffeyville schools and later attended the University of Kansas, where he received his bachelor of arts degree in 1940. He passed the Kansas bar examination in June of 1942 and was appointed assistant county attorney of Coffeyville on July 11, 1942.

In 1938, he married the former Miss Zerita Johnston, who survives him. Other survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Akers of Coffeyville; three brothers, Captain Milton Akers, now in New Guinea, Howard and Dwight Akers; and a niece and nephew, also of Coffeyville.

#### KENNETH R. BAXTER

Sergeant Kenneth R. Baxter died of injuries received in an airplane crash in Italy on February 19, 1944. He was city attorney in Marysville before entering the army.

Sergeant Baxter was born May 26, 1905, at Bloomington, Ind. He received his early education at Axtell and Marysville, attended Highland College for two years, and received his law degree from Washburn College Law School in 1931. He was admitted to the state bar the same year and practiced law in Marysville for several years before he was elected city attorney.

After volunteering in the U. S. Army Air Corps in December, 1942, he received training at Miami Beach, Fla., before being sent overseas as engineer on a B-29.

He is survived by his wife, the former Frances P. Wardell; two daughters, Mary Frances and Joan; a son, Kenneth Russell, Jr., his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Baxter, all of Topeka; three sisters, Mrs. Audrey Scmitt of California, Mrs. Geraldine Bartram and Miss Mary Baxter, of Topeka; two brothers, Robert Baxter with the U. S. Army in Guam and Mack Baxter of Topeka.

#### CURTIS ANDREW BURTON

Staff Sergeant Curtis Andrew Burton entered the military service on April 24, 1943, and died of infantile paralysis on July 17, 1944, while in Officer's Candidate School at New Orleans, La.

He was the son of Dwight and Myrtle Burton at 1206 Munson in Topeka, Kan., and was born September 14, 1918. He was graduated from Kansas University with Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1940, and received his Bachelor of Laws Degree from the same institution and was admitted to the Kansas Bar just before his induction into the army. While at Kansas University he was an outstanding representative of the colored students in school affairs, having been honored with membership on the Men's Student Council and the YMCA Cabinet, as an Associate Justice on the Student Supreme Court, and as Assistant Editor of the University Daily Kansan. He was also a prominent member of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity.

Two memorials have been established in his honor since his death, at Topeka, the Curtis Burton Club of the American Legion and the Burton-Thompson Chapter of American War Dads.

#### JOHN CARLYLE FOULKS

First Lieut. John Carlyle Foulks, of Atchison, was born in Ness City, Kan., on January 14, 1909, and killed in line of duty on September 15, 1943. (See Memorial, page 103 in December, 1943, Bulletin.)

#### JAMES ALBERT HUDELSON, JR.

Staff Sergeant James Albert Hudelson, Jr., former Ottawa attorney, was killed in action in Germany on February 27, 1945.

Born in 1911 in Pomona, he attended Washburn University Law School where he received his law degree. He was admitted to the Kansas Bar in 1934.

He was a practicing attorney in Ottawa for eight years before volunteering for service three years ago.

Sergeant Hudelson, whose wife is the former Miss Lenore Doster of Topeka, had been overseas since December 1, 1944, and was with a field artillery battalion.

He is survived by his wife; three brothers, Lieut. John Hudelson with the AAF overseas, Corp. Robert Hudelson, now in Brittany, and Nicholas Hudelson of Pomona; three sisters, Mary, of Boston, Mass., Mrs. Lois Patton, Chula Vista, Cal., and Mrs. Frances Wheeler of the home; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Hudelson of Pomona.

#### WILTON D. MILLER

Lieutenant Wilton D. (Bus) Miller was killed in action in southern Germany on April 11, 1945. Lieutenant Miller entered military service in December, 1941, and in July, 1942, he was commissioned a second lieutenant, at Fort Knox, Ky. He received further training at Camp Bowie, Texas, for a year before going overseas.

Born April 15, 1916, in Belleville, Kan., Lieutenant Miller received his early education in the Belleville schools. He attended Emporia State Teachers College for four years, and received his law degree from the Washburn College Law School in 1941 and was admitted to the bar the same year. He was admitted to the Kansas Bar Association a month after entering the army.

Surviving him are his wife, the former Bobby Jean Carroll and little son, Davey, of Topeka, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Miller of Long Beach, Cal.

#### VICTOR J. ROGERS

Victor J. Rogers of Wichita died at the Wichita Veterans Hospital on October 9, 1944.

He received his commission as captain in the Judge Advocate General's Department of the United States Army Reserve in 1936, and in 1938 was promoted to a major in the same department. After the passage of the selective service act, he was called to Washington to serve in the office of the Judge Advocate General and stayed there until the spring of 1943 when he was transferred to active duty in the Panama Canal Zone. While serving in Panama he contracted tropical fever, whereupon he was returned to the States and given an honorable discharge in March of 1944, and subsequently died of a stroke at the Veterans Hospital.

Born October 24, 1898, in Wichita, Victor Rogers received his early education in Wichita, and after attending the University of Kansas for two years, he enrolled in George Washington University School of Law. He received his LL.B. from George Washington University in June, 1921, and was admitted to the bar in January, 1922. After several years of practicing law in Wichita he became associated with the firm of McGill and Castor, and in 1932 was made a member of this firm which then became known as McGill, Castor & Rogers.

He left no survivors, both his mother and sister having predeceased him.

#### PAUL C. STEINRAUF

First Lieutenant Paul C. Steinrauf of the U. S. Army was killed in action at Forbach, Alsace, near Saarbrucken, Germany, on February 18, 1945. He was clerk of the Court of Topeka before entering the army.

Born November 13, 1910, in Topeka, he attended the Topeka schools and later the Washburn College Law School, receiving his law degree June 6, 1933. He was admitted to the state bar the same month. From 1933 to 1941 he was deputy clerk of the Court of Topeka, and elected clerk of that court in the fall of 1940. In August, 1942, he went to Fort Leavenworth as a volunteer officer candidate. From Fort Leavenworth, he was sent to Fort Riley and commissioned a second lieutenant on February 18, 1943. He was later assigned to the 103d infantry division as platoon leader in the 103d Reconnaissance Troop. On October 1, 1944, he shipped overseas, landing at Marseilles, France, and went into action in the Strasbourg sector November 1, 1944. On February 1, 1945, he was promoted to first lieutenant.

Of his services his superior officer wrote: "Paul was one of the key fighting men of this division. He helped the division win its present enviable fighting record. His gallant conduct will always remain an inspiration to his comrades."
