F O R E W O R D

The Hon. Howard W. Harper, President of the Kansas Bar Association, has been requested to prepare an article on a subject of his choosing for publication in this issue of the *Kansas Judicial Council Bulletin*. He has done so and the article is timely and should command the attention of the attorneys throughout the state. It is entitled "Kansas Lawyers' Challenge."

Howard W. Harper was graduated from Washburn University with an undergraduate degree in 1937 and received his L.L.B. and J.D. from Washburn in 1940. He served as Geary County Attorney from 1942-1947. He served as a Kansas State Senator from 1961-1965.

He is a member and past president of the Geary County Bar Association and the Central Kansas Bar Association. He is a member of the Judicature Society; Fellow, International Academy of Trial Lawyers and International Society of Barristers; Law-Science Academy of America; has served on the Board of Governors of the Association of Insurance Attorneys; and the Kansas and American Bar Associations.

The *Kansas Judicial Council Bulletin* contains the article written by President Harper and summarized tables showing the volume of work in the Supreme Court; District Courts; and, to the extent possible, the Court of Appeals. The period reported is from July 1, 1976 through June 30, 1977.

A brief summary of the activities and accomplishments of the Judicial Council for the past year will follow:

During 1977 the Judicial Council had two changes in membership and the addition of a new position. Hon. Elwaine F. Pomeroy of Topeka was designated Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee and by virtue of holding that office is a member of the Judicial Council. He replaces J. C. Tillotson of Norton.

Hon. E. Richard Brewster of Topeka was designated Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee and by virtue of that office is a member of the Judicial Council. He replaces John F. Hayes of Hutchinson.

A new position on the Judicial Council was created by 1977 S.B. 315 (Chapter 111, 1977 *Session Laws of Kansas*) which provides that one judge of the Court of

KANSAS LAWYERS' CHALLENGE

Once each year the current president of the Kansas Bar Association has the rare opportunity to write a short article for the benefit of the legal profession to be printed on these pages. Each writer approaches the task with a desire to treat a subject in a manner which will challenge all of us to become better lawyers and reflect credit upon the profession which we practice. In the next few paragraphs I hope to do just that.

The KBBA was organized in 1882 and has functioned reasonably well ever since. In all that time—95 years—it has never really had a home of its own. It was not needed in the early years. The business of the association was handled by the officers from their own private offices. As you can imagine, the "office" moved every year from one town to another with each new president. In 1953 we hired our first executive secretary to better organize our work. Ken Klein, who currently holds that office, is our third executive secretary. When we first started we had only a part time employee as an assistant to the executive secretary. We now have a staff of five secretaries, clerks and a bookkeeper. In 1968 we undertook a Public Relations program and expanded our Continuing Legal Education program. We hired T. C. Anderson to divide his time between the two tasks. He rendered a wonderful service to the lawyers of Kansas the public alike while he was with us. He developed a good Public Relations program and an outstanding CLE program to the point we have 28 to 30 legal seminars each year covering a wide spectrum of law subjects. T. C. left us to take an executive secretary's job with the Kansas Association of Certified Public Accountants at a salary he could not afford to turn down, and one we could not afford to pay. We miss him like a right arm. Upon leaving he recommended we separate the work of the Continuing Legal Education and Public Relations programs for the reason there was too much work for one person to handle both properly. By the time this article reaches print, we will very likely have hired two people for these two jobs and will be moving ahead in an effort to render more and better service to the lawyers of Kansas.

As you know, we have 39 committees and 9 sections. There are 657 lawyers working in these committees and section. We estimate that their work alone exceeds 7570 hours per year; this not counting the staff time. It may be difficult for you to believe, but last year we mailed out from our KBA office in Topeka over one million pieces of correspondence, pamphlets and literature of all kinds. Our office is a busy place and it takes a good deal of management to keep it going.

At the time we employed our first executive secretary, our budget was \$27,000.00. It had grown to \$106,000.00 per year by 1968 when I was first elected to the Executive Council. Our budget this year is \$447,375.00. Next year it will be more. I fully expect it to continue upward in the future. We are certain to have some form of specialization and required Continuing Legal Education program. Every intelligent man I know deals in probabilities. We don't know for certain what is going to happen, but it is very probable our association and the service it renders its members and the public will continue to grow in the years to come. We started with a very few lawyers in 1882. By 1953 we had grown to 1400, and now we have 3318 members. This is 84% of the lawyers registered in Kansas.

Those of you who have been in our present headquarters at 1334 South Topeka Boulevard in Topeka know we do not have a single room big enough for a

committee meeting, much less a Council meeting. Before T. C. Anderson left, he shared a small room with a clerk-typist. It was located through a doorway to the reception room which doubles as a mag card room. How he stood the noise and confusion is hard to understand. Now we will have two new employees and no more facilities. We will have to make do with what we have, but it's not comfortable for anyone. We have, in fact, outgrown our quarters and need to provide adequate housing for our own staff and at the same time build what we need in the way of a suitable facility for the work of our committees and sections as well as for use by the lawyers of our association when they are in Topeka. What we need is a Law Center Building. What are we doing about it? Back in 1970 when Bob Martin was president of KBA, a building project was suggested. A committee was appointed and promptly went to work. We purchased a site consisting of some choice real estate and four rental houses immediately south of our New Supreme Court Building. It is a beautiful location. When the building is completed, you will be able to look across the street north directly at the Supreme Court Building. We purchased this property for \$140,000.00. We now owe \$55,388.70 on the principal. The interest is paid to date. We are paying this off at \$20,000.00 a year. Yes, the rentals are still rented and producing.

After purchasing the real estate we will need, we undertook a campaign to raise money through voluntary contributions from lawyers. Every Council district (there are 9 of them) was organized, and in turn nearly all of our counties were organized within each district. We printed an attractive brochure along with all the other materials and pledge cards we needed. Ken Klein, T. C. Anderson, and I conducted meetings all over Kansas in every district. I thought we worked hard, but we only produced pledges to date of \$171,620.00. Cash in the amount of \$85,442.46 has been paid in with interest. As you may recall, our goal was to raise one million dollars to build the kind of structure we wanted—nothing elaborate—just serviceable and attractive. We are now at a point where the Law Center Committee, chaired by Bob Galloway of Marysville, needs your support. The Law Center is a good project. It affords each of us an opportunity to have a part in constructing a building as a tribute to the lawyers and citizens of Kansas. It is truly a once in a lifetime opportunity. Never before have you had an opportunity to participate in this kind of project, but we need each other's help to make it go. I urge each of you—lawyers and judges alike—to send in your pledge, and make it large enough to make you proud you did it. Pledges from \$1000.00 to \$10,000.00 by established lawyers will get the job done. In my judgment any lawyer who has been in practice for ten years and has established himself as a lawyer ought not shy away from a pledge of \$1000.00. Lawyers with more experience and a better practice should consider giving more. Memorial gifts are desirable. We have one \$10,000.00 gift from a daughter of a lawyer who was a third generation lawyer in Kansas, given in memory of her brother, father and grandfather. We will have a builders' wall in the new Law Center which will constitute a permanent record of the lawyers who made the building possible. To the young lawyers in Kansas, I suggest you spread your gift out over a period of five years and make a contribution of \$100.00 each year. It is a commitment to your faith in yourselves and our profession. Please note the gifts are to the Kansas Bar Foundation, Inc., a non-profit corporation which entitles you to an income tax deduction.

This is the challenge to those of us who make our living in the legal profession, whether at the bar or on the bench.

The Change in Appellate Court Structure

Concomitant the unification of Kansas' trial courts on January 10, 1977, the appellate court structure was changed. The Court of Appeals came into being as the state's intermediate appellate court. While the Supreme Court retained its jurisdiction over original actions, its jurisdiction over appeals was altered.

The Court of Appeals was provided jurisdiction to hear all appeals from the district court except those reviewable in the district court and those in which direct appeal to the Supreme Court is required. Writs of habeas corpus also may be prosecuted in the Court of Appeals. The Supreme Court retains appellate jurisdiction over cases involving class A or B felonies or a sentence of life imprisonment or over any case in which a Kansas or United States statute has been declared unconstitutional. Moreover, the Supreme Court has discretionary jurisdiction to review decisions of the Court of Appeals. Cases may be transferred from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court by its order upon its own motion, upon that of a party, or upon request of the Court of Appeals.

To reflect this change in appellate court structure, the rules of appellate practice also were changed. These changes plus the structural changes have meant that caseload statistics for fiscal 1977 portray a different picture than in years past. True comparability of data over the years is thus hard to achieve.

The new *Rules Relating to Supreme Court, Court of Appeals and Appellate Practice* were instituted on January 10. Any case filed prior to that date was and is governed by the old rules, unless the appellate court concurs in a stipulation by both parties that the new rules shall apply.

Consequently, the statistical depiction of appellate caseload which follows encompasses cases which may come under either set of rules. Since only two cases had been terminated under the new rules as of June 30, the effect of this dichotomy on dispositional information is minor. However, the effect on commencement data is significant.

Under the old rules, a case was considered commenced once the notice of appeal was filed with the clerk of the district court. But the case was not docketed in the Supreme Court until the record on appeal was received. There were, as a result, many voluntary dismissals of such cases between the filing of the notice of appeal and the docketing of the case. These "pipeline" cases were reflected in past years' statistics as commencements and terminations at the district court level.

Under the new rules, cases are docketed immediately upon receipt of the copy of the notice of appeal. Any terminations now are shown as terminations at the appellate level. Whether the attrition rate of cases, from the date of receipt of the notice of appeal (the docketing date, also, under the new rules) to the date the record is filed, will remain at its pre-January level cannot be assessed. But the effect of this procedural change must be considered in comparing these statistics with those of previous years.

Although the caseload data is separated by court, the formats used have not been changed. A single table has been added which combines the total caseload figures for both courts. This table, titled *Summary of Appellate Court Caseload*, follows the data on the Court of Appeals.

APPEALS TERMINATED BY OPINION-YEAR ENDING 6/30/77

Following is a time study of the 256 opinions rendered by the Supreme Court on appeal during FY 1977. This figure includes all cases in which an opinion was rendered and, therefore, excludes only voluntary dismissals or involuntary dismissals on motion of court or appellee. All these cases were terminated under the old Supreme Court rules.

The study shows the average time in months required to dispose of cases in the various categories. Statistics from the five prior years are included for comparative purposes.

The docketing date used to compute these figures is the date of filing of the record on appeal. This is the normal docketing date, notwithstanding the previous docketing of some cases. For the three criminal interlocutory appeals docketed under rule 17 motions, the docketing date is the date the motion was granted.

The readiness date is the date of filing of the appellee's brief. In the few cases in which that brief was not filed, its due date is used instead.

The submission date is the date the case was argued before the court.

IV. Urban county appeals

APPEALS TERMINATED BY OPINION—January 10—June 30, 1977

Excluding voluntary dismissals and involuntary dismissals on motion of court or appellee, the Court of Appeals rendered opinions in 98 cases during the six-month period. Two of these were decided under the new rules effective January 10. The remaining 96 appeals—87 civil and 9 criminal—were decided under the old rules and were ready at time of transfer from the Supreme Court. The average age of these cases (from notice of appeal) at time of transfer was 15.8 months, with an average time from readiness to transfer of 5.5 months. Once transferred to the Court of Appeals, the average time to decision was 3.4 months.

Effect of Court Unification on Trial Court Statistics

On January 10, 1976 the state courts of Kansas were unified into the district court. All state courts of limited and special jurisdiction—probate, county, juvenile, and city courts with county-wide jurisdiction—were abolished.

These structural changes necessitated minor changes in the systems for reporting caseload data. With regard to the former lower court caseload, only the reporting of probate matters was unaffected by the changes.

The district court summaries which follow contain no variance through the year in the chapter 60 civil and domestic relations case reporting. They do contain, however, a change in the typology of criminal case commencements. From July 1, 1976 through January 9, 1977, all district court criminal cases were reported as in past years. Effective January 10, the typology of criminal cases was changed in order to characterize better the influx of misdemeanor cases formerly handled in the limited jurisdiction courts. The new breakdown of criminal cases reflects the class of crime for both felonies and misdemeanors. In addition, the breakdown of appeals to the district court was changed to indicate the source of the original decision—district magistrate judge or municipal court.

Criminal and civil caseload statistics for the county and city courts are presented only through January 9, 1977. These tables are identical to those of past years. The civil includes all chapter 61 cases with no separation of small claims cases. The criminal includes all misdemeanors, felony preliminaries, and traffic cases with no breakdown by type.

For the second half of the fiscal year these cases are reported in the district court summaries. As indicated above, misdemeanor cases have been included in the new typology which took effect January 10. Traffic cases commenced or terminated on or after that date are reported in a separate table titled Traffic Caseload Summary.

Also in a separate table for the latter half of the year are the caseload statistics for those civil cases which correspond to the former lower court caseload. The title of this table is Chapter 61 and Small Claims Caseload Summary.

The procedures for reporting probate matters were not changed during the year, in spite of the dissolution of the probate courts. There is, therefore, a single set of tables depicting these matters for the entire year.

It should be evident that any comparisons between this year's statistics and those of previous years should be drawn only with much caution. Except in the area of chapter 60 and domestic relations cases, allowances must be made for the changes in the reporting system; no other tables are fully compatible with those of previous years.

Italicized dates indicate the first date of the regular term of court—a. 9 a.m.; b. 9:30 a.m.; c. 10 a.m.; d. 10:30 a.m.; e. 11 a.m.; f. 1 p.m.; g. 1:30 p.m.; h. 2 p.m.; i. 2:30 p.m.

NOTE 1: In Bourbon, Linn and Miami Counties court convenes at 10 a.m. for trial to the court and 9 a.m. for jury trials.

NOTE 2: In Douglas County on the days on which a term of court opens, the civil docket will be called beginning at 9:30 a.m. in Division I and 2:30 p.m. in Division II. Criminal cases involving defendants bound over for appearance at the Court Days will be called beginning at 10:30 a.m. in Division I and 1:30 p.m. in Division II.

NOTE 3: In Labette County, Parsons Division, motions and arraignments will be scheduled on Monday of each week. All such motions (and arraignments) will normally be set for hearing on the second Monday after filing, unless otherwise requested and arranged with the Clerk's office.

NOTE 4: In Greeley, Hamilton and Kearny Counties, Mountain Time is shown; in Finney, Scott and Wichita Counties, Central Time is shown.

NOTE 5: In Haskell, Grant, Stanton, Morton, Stevens and Seward Counties court will convene as follows—Central Time:

First day of each Regular Term—10 a.m.

Motion Days—Forenoon Sessions—10 a.m.

Afternoon Sessions—2 p.m.

Jury Sessions (unless otherwise ordered)—10 a.m.

NOTE 6: In Edwards, Hodgeman, Lane, Ness, Pawnee and Rush Counties Court will convene as follows:

Motion Days—Forenoon Sessions—9:30 a.m.

Afternoon Sessions—1:30 a.m.

Jury Sessions (unless otherwise ordered)—9:30 a.m.

NOTE 7: In Reno County Court Days will be Monday through Friday each week, legal holidays excepted. Motion days are the first four Fridays in each month, legal holidays excepted.

NOTE 8: In Sedgwick County regular Court Days are all days, Monday through Friday, except holidays.

All motions in civil cases and domestic relations cases shall state the date and time the motion is to be heard. In all felony cases where the defendant is bound over to the district court, and all appeals from inferior courts shall be arraigned on Wednesday of the second following week at 2 p.m. by the presiding judge of the Criminal Department.

NOTE 9: In Wyandotte County all pre-trial motions and contempt citations in domestic relations cases, except motions requiring an evidentiary hearing, will be regularly set for hearing on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons of each week before an Associate District Judge. All motions and contempt citations filed by S.R.S. or in reciprocal support actions cases are regularly set for hearing on Wednesday afternoon of each week before an Associate District Judge.

Each District Judge has one regular motion day each month for all other motions in actions pending in his court, including post-trial motions in domestic relations cases, on Friday afternoons, as follows:

Division 1 & 2 First Friday of the month

Division 3 & 4 Second Friday of the month

Division 5 & 6 Third Friday of the month

Division 7 Fourth Friday of the month.

Notice of all such settings will be given by publication in the Wyandotte Echo, the Court's official paper, and by mailing a copy of the paper to all attorneys properly registered in the case.

Any motion requiring an evidentiary hearing must be specially set by the judge to which the case is assigned. Motions in criminal cases are assigned for hearing by the Administrative Judge. Arraignments in felony cases are held on the third Friday of each month at 1:30 p.m. in the Division assigned to criminal matters.

NOTE 10: In Wallace County Mountain Time is shown.

NOTE 11: In Shawnee County regular court days are all days, Monday through Friday, except holidays.

Chapter 61 Civil Docket is held in room 301 at 9 a.m. each Wednesday. The Traffic Docket is held in room 301 at 10 a.m. each Thursday. Small Claims commence at 9 a.m. each Monday in room 301.

Motions of an evidentiary nature must be specially set and local District Court rule 3.301 must be complied with as well as Supreme Court rule 133. Accusations in contempt are heard on a three week rotation basis of the District Court Judges with two divisions hearing the same weekly, one at 9 a.m. and the other at 10:30 a.m. on Fridays.

The Criminal Docket for Limited Actions is held in room 310 at 9 a.m. each Thursday. Arraignments in felony cases, after bound over, are at 1:30 p.m. each Friday heard by a District Judge on a rotation basis. Probate matters are set specifically.
