

FOREWORD

This is the first BULLETIN of the Judicial Council since April, 1943. The July BULLETIN was omitted this year in the interest of conservation of materials and because our printing allowance was reduced by the last legislature.

We print on our cover a late portrait of Judge Richard J. Hopkins, who died in the performance of his duties on August 28, 1943.

At the time this BULLETIN is being prepared, the daily press carries the report of the death of First Lt. John C. Foulks, of Atchison, while in the military service on foreign soil. This is the first definite report of the death in action of any of the Kansas lawyers in the service.

In this issue of the BULLETIN are summaries made up from statistics gathered from the various courts of the state for the calendar year ending June 30, 1943.

At the last session of the legislature, the House of Representatives adopted a resolution setting out that the thirty-seven judicial districts in the state have been built up by a process of attaching and detaching counties for judicial purposes and that as the state is now so divided it is difficult for the legislature to determine upon any plan of properly compensating the judges, since the work is not evenly distributed, and that adequate salary provisions and retirements systems for the judicial personnel cannot be intelligently enacted until a thorough study and survey have been made, and the Legislative Council was directed to make a study and survey and report its findings and conclusions to the 1945 regular session, together with such recommendations as that council saw fit to adopt.

A committee of the Legislative Council has already commenced to make that study. You may be interested in all or part of the work to be done by that committee or by the Legislative Council. If so, it is suggested that you make comparison of the statistics as contained in this issue, with those of previous years, and if you have any views on the matter, you communicate them to Dr. F. H. Guild, Director of Research of the Legislative Council, at Topeka.

This BULLETIN does not contain any list of Kansas lawyers in the military service, which has been a regular part of each BULLETIN since July, 1942, but we expect to compile and print a complete revised list in the December, 1943, BULLETIN, together with a list of motion days in the district courts for 1944.

Attention is called to the changes in membership of the Judicial Council since our last BULLETIN, and the short biographies of our retiring members and new members.


We are glad to be able to print in this issue the review of Dean Wigmore's last book by J. C. Ruppenthal, former member and secretary of the Judicial Council from 1927 to 1941. We also include a timely article on the necessity of extra gasoline for jurors by Judge Edgar C. Bennett.

PERSONNEL OF THE COUNCIL

In each odd-numbered year the terms of a portion of the members of the Judicial Council expire, the appointments for all members except the Chairmen of the Judiciary Committees of the Senate and of the House being made by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.


When the Judicial Council was originally constituted in 1927, two of its members were the Honorable Edward L. Fischer of Kansas City, Judge of the Twenty-ninth Judicial District, Division No. 1, and the Honorable Robert C. Foulston of Wichita. Both of these men served continuously and faithfully until July, 1943. Judge Fischer ably presented the views of the courts in the metropolitan areas, while Mr. Foulston just as ably presented the views of the lawyers engaged in practice in our larger cities, dealing with public and private corporation law and the problems usually confronting lawyers practicing in the urban sections of the state. The services of both were of material worth to the Judicial Council and through it to the state of Kansas. To succeed Judge Fischer and Mr. Foulston, respectively, the Chief Justice appointed the Honorable Grover Pierpont of Wichita, Judge of the Eighteenth Judicial District, Division No. 3, and the Honorable George Templar of Arkansas City. Photograhs of the retiring and newly appointed members, with short biographical sketches, are found in this issue of the *BULLETIN*.

The terms of Walter G. Thiele of Lawrence, Justice of the Supreme Court, and Mr. Samuel E. Bartlett of Wichita, also expired this year, and they were appointed to succeed themselves.




HONORABLE EDWARD L. FISCHER

Judge Fischer was born in Wyandotte county, Kansas. After completing his preliminary education in the schools of Kansas City, Kansas, he entered the University of Kansas, graduating from the Law School in 1892. He entered the practice of law in Kansas City, and was appointed Judge of the City Court in 1897 and was elected to the same position in 1899. In the latter year he was elected as district judge, serving for four years. He was engaged in the practice of law from 1904 to 1909. In the election of 1908 he was again elected as a Judge of the District Court and since that time he has been re-elected each four years. Judge Fischer is the oldest district judge in Kansas in point of service. Judge Fischer was one of the original appointees to the Judicial Council. His counsel and sound advice will be missed by his colleagues on the Council.




HONORABLE ROBERT C. FOULSTON

Mr. Foulston is a native of Kansas, having been born in Wichita county. He entered Kansas University and was graduated from the Law School in 1911. In the latter year he was admitted to the Bar and entered the practice at Wichita. He served as city prosecutor from 1913 to 1915 and as city attorney from April, 1917, to November, 1926. When the Judicial Council was established in 1927 Mr. Foulston was one of the original appointees to membership. Not only is Mr. Foulston one of the outstanding lawyers of Kansas, as the records of the trial and appellate courts amply demonstrate, but he has taken an active interest in civic, educational and religious affairs. Limits of space preclude any detailed reference to such activities, or to the many business affiliations which have come to him because of his outstanding ability. His colleagues on the Judicial Council sincerely regret that circumstances prevented his serving further.



HONORABLE GROVER PIERPONT

Judge Pierpont, who succeeds Judge Fischer on the Judicial Council, is a native of West Virginia. He attended Marietta College at Marietta, Ohio, and later studied law at Ohio State University and Northwesern University, being admitted to the Bar in Ohio in 1909, and later in the same year to the Bar of Virginia. In 1911 he took the examinations for and was admitted to the Bar in Kansas, and entered the practice of law at Wichita. He served four years as Judge of the City Court of Wichita (1914-1918) and in 1924 he was elected to the district court bench. At each succeeding election he has been reelected. Judge Pierpont has always shown an active interest in educational matters and has served as a member of the Board of Education of Wichita, and also as a member of the Board of Trustees of Fairmont College and Friends University in Wichita. His appointment to the Judicial Council will bring to its membership one who by training and experience is well fitted for the work.



HONORABLE GEORGE TEMPLAR

Mr. Templar was born and reared in Cowley county, Kansas. He was graduated from Washburn Law School in 1927 and immediately entered the practice of law at Arkansas City. He represented the Fiftieth Representative District in the Kansas Legislature from 1933 to 1941. During his last term he was chairman of the Judiciary Committee, and ex-officio a member of the Judicial Council. He will not be new to the work of the Council to which he will now bring the benefits of a wide experience both as a lawyer and as a legislator. Mr. Templar succeeds Mr. Robert C. Foulston on the Judicial Council.

A PROPOSED RULE FOR PROBATE COURTS

In the December, 1942, BULLETIN the following appeared:

"Under section 278 of the probate code, G. S. 1941 Supp. 59-2501, the supreme court is authorized to promulgate rules to regulate practice under the act. It has been suggested that the Judicial Council recommend to the court a rule pertaining to the sufficiency of waiver of notice, and of a nature similar to the present rule 51 dealing with entries of appearance in the district court. Such a rule has been formulated, reading as follows:

"In any proceeding in the probate court wherein any competent person or fiduciary may waive any notice required by the probate code or ordered by the court to be given, solely by personally signing an instrument designed for that purpose, the court in which the proceeding is pending shall not regard the waiver of notice as valid unless the signature of the person to the instrument is acknowledged before an officer authorized by law to take acknowledgments."

"You are invited to give the matter your attention and to advise the Council of your views."

In response to the request, we received less than five responses, some favoring and some opposing such a rule.

We are again calling your attention to the matter.

Do you think such a rule should be recommended to the Supreme Court, or adopted by it? Should the rule as suggested stand, or should there be one of different form, or none? Or would you substitute for an acknowledgment before a notary public, an execution in the presence of witnesses, or let it be executed in either manner?

We earnestly request that judges and lawyers let us know their views.

EXTRA GASOLINE RATION FOR JURORS

EDGAR C. BENNETT, Judge, Twenty-first Judicial District

The Judicial Council found a new outlet for its energies with the advent of gasoline rationing. When the regulations governing rationing were examined it was discovered that they contained the following provision:

"**JURORS:**—Preferred mileage is not allowable to members of a petit or grand jury, since they are not Government representatives or agents."

When this situation came to the attention of the Council, in November, 1942, Justice Thiele designated Judge Bennett to attempt to secure a modification of this regulation for the benefit of Kansas jurors. It was felt that the regulation was probably adopted to govern the eastern seaboard states where gasoline rationing was first installed. If gasoline rationing was to be as restrictive of travel as it then appeared it might be, a condition could easily have resulted in which the Courts of Kansas could not function because of the inability of farmer jurors to obtain sufficient gasoline to enable them to attend. The situation obtaining in agricultural communities with our greater distances was at once called to the attention of O. P. A., during Mr. Leon Henderson's tenure in that organization. The Council was told by O. P. A. that a study would be made. As January 1, and new terms of court approached with no relief promised, the matter was called to the personal attention of Hon. James F. Byrnes, the newly appointed head of O. W. M. Within less than a week Mr. Byrnes had secured a change in the regulation to its present form.

A little known fact concerning Mr. Byrnes is that as a young man he served as a court reporter, and, having some firsthand actual knowledge of the problem presented to him, was thus able to deal intelligently with it.

The present regulation provides for a special ration: 231—1394, 7851.
ARTICLE III, Section (b)

"To transport a person who is called, or is serving, as a juror on a grand or petit jury in criminal or civil cases, between his home or lodgings and the place where he is required to be present for jury service: *Provided*, That the applicant shall present to the Board a statement from the presiding judge or officer responsible for the attendance of jurors, setting forth that the presence of the applicant is required for jury service and the number of miles necessary to provide the required transportation."

BOOK REVIEW

A Guide to American International Law and Practice as found in the United States Constitution, treaties, statutes, decisions, executive orders, administrative regulations, diplomatic correspondence, and army and navy instructions, including wartime law. By John H. Wigmore. 1943. Matthew Bender & Company, Albany, N. Y.

The last of many legal publications of John H. Wigmore before his recent tragic death was his Guide to American International Law. For American lawyers, who almost without exception have given little attention to international law, this work is invaluable. That a volume of 500 pages is only a guide, gives some idea of the scope and ramification of international law. It makes no effort to state the law except in the broadest outline, but tells where to find the law in constitutions, treaties, statutes; in reports of conventions and arbitrations; in recent books and magazine articles that describe a given field, or pursue a limited inquiry intensively.

Doctor Wigmore on this finger-board indicates four parts: International substantive common law, the law for a state of war and procedure in international controversy, international legislation and international arbitration and adjudication. To the last part are appended the constitution of the Permanent Court of International Justice, and its rules of procedure; also the United States-Mexico General Claims Commission, with its convention and rules of procedure. Even the cost of ten of the leading sets of books and publications and where to get them is stated. The tables of materials and index to constitutions, statutes, treaties and conventions, to judicial decisions and to authors of articles and books are exhaustive. Besides these there is a general index. The use of numbered sections is excellent for reference, but is hampered somewhat by sectionizing each of the four parts separately from 1 to 260, 218, 144 and 129, respectively. Lawyer or layman who wants the latest and most thorough handbook needs this.—J. C. RUPPENTHAL.

COMMENT ON STATISTICAL TABLES

The statistical tables for the district and probate courts which are printed in this issue follow generally the form used in the October, 1942, BULLETIN, at which time these tables were revised and condensed from the forms previously used. This year we have full reports from the city and county courts. This was made possible under the provisions of chapter 150 of the Session Laws of 1943, amending G. S. Supp. 28-117c, to require these courts to make reports to the Judicial Council.

BUSINESS OF THE DISTRICT COURTS

Our reports show that there were fewer cases in the district courts of the state as a whole for the year ending June 30, 1943, than in the preceding year. During the current year there were 13,640 civil cases commenced and 12,940 terminated, while in the previous year there were 15,221 commenced and 14,850 terminated. In the current year 1,689 criminal cases were commenced and 1,638 terminated in the district courts, as against 2,329 commenced and 2,115 terminated in the preceding year. There were 223 civil jury trials, compared to 398 in the previous year, and 174 trials in criminal cases, compared to 292 in the year ending June 30, 1942.

The immediate decline in the number of cases disposed of in the last two years is easily understood under the present conditions which are apparent to all. Outstanding factors which have produced this decrease in number of cases include: (1) the number of lawyers in military service and in federal and defense work; (2) the decline in automobile accidents caused by tire and gasoline rationing, which has reduced this type of litigation which was so productive of jury trials; (3) the decline in mortgage foreclosures. All of these conditions are temporary and should not be considered as indicating a permanent decrease in the business of the district courts. The number of civil cases disposed of by the district courts for the state as a whole in 1942 was 14,850, as compared with 13,921 in 1927, when reports were first made to the Judicial Council.

During the current year, the average time from petition to trial in contested civil cases was 5.85 months and in criminal cases 3.70 months. Seventy-four percent of contested civil cases and 80 percent of criminal cases were tried within six months from the date of filing. These figures refer only to contested cases, and show that our district courts for the state as a whole are disposing of their business expeditiously. Motions were disposed of in 19 days average time, while the average time for demurrers was 94 days.

This year we attempted to secure the number of cases continued on account of military service of the litigants, lawyers or material witnesses, but found only 82 cases in the entire state in which this reason for continuance appears from the records. This is only $\frac{1}{10}$ of one percent of the pending cases, but there are probably many more which do not show on the records.

More divorce cases were filed than in the previous year, but more were dismissed and fewer divorces were granted to wives. Table A-5 shows that 6,108 cases were disposed of, compared to 5,930 in 1942; of which 1,713 were dismissed, as compared to 1,594 in 1942. 892 of these cases were contested,

and divorce was denied in 27 cases. 3,080 divorces were granted to wives and 1,288 to husbands, compared to 3,325 divorces to wives and 983 to husbands in 1942. This makes a total of 4,368 divorces granted, compared to 4,308 in 1942.

We have omitted Table A-6, "Grounds for divorces granted," and Table B-2, "Time elapsed in criminal cases," but have included in Table B-1 the average time from the filing to the trial of criminal cases. We have also eliminated the distinction between pre-trial and post-trial motions, and the separate listing of motions in civil and criminal cases, since all of these motions showed the same trends in our previous statistics. We have, however, retained the separate listing of motions and demurrers, which are set out in Table A-4.

BUSINESS IN THE PROBATE COURTS

The form of probate statistics in Tables C-1, C-2 and C-3 is substantially the same as was used in 1942.

There was a slight decline in the number of estates opened during the year, and a substantial increase in new guardianship cases as well as determinations of descent and supervision of trusts. Juvenile cases increased from 2,065 in 1942 to 2,504 in 1943. There were more adoption proceedings but fewer insanity hearings and fewer marriage licenses issued. Marriage licenses declined from 26,763 in 1942 to 25,297 in 1943, and marriages performed by the probate judges declined from 9,204 to 8,420.

The outstanding fact shown by the probate statistics is that 63 percent of estates were closed within fifteen months from the date of filing, as compared with 15 percent in 1942. In the October, 1942, BULLETIN, we commented upon this remarkably low percentage of estates closed promptly during that year, and it is gratifying to note that now almost two-thirds of the estates are closed within fifteen months or shortly after the minimum statutory time. The percentage of estates pending less than one year has also increased, but not to so large a degree.

In guardianships, the percentage of cases in which either an inventory or an account has been filed during the year has increased from 33 percent in 1942 to 39 percent in 1943, but there is still room for much improvement. In the trusts under supervision, accounts were filed in more than half of the cases.

There were 2,597 cases for determination of descent, compared with 2,110 in the previous year.

CITY AND COUNTY COURTS

Table D-1 shows the disposition of civil cases in city and county courts, and Table B-2 shows the disposition of criminal cases in these courts. The criminal work of the city and county courts for the state as a whole also appears in Table B-3 which shows the nature of the crimes and the disposition of the cases.

Table D-1 shows 1,077 civil cases in the 42 county courts and 9,754 civil cases in the 11 city courts. There were trials in 170 of these cases in the county courts and in 1,017 in the city courts. Garnishments were issued in more than half the cases in the city courts and in about one-fourth of the cases in the county courts. Almost ten percent of the cases were for forcible detainer, and there were a substantial number of replevin suits, and some attachments.

Some of the county courts appear to have very little business, while some,

like Butler, Finney and Ford counties, have quite a few cases. Most of the city courts have a great many cases, often more than the district courts of the same counties.

From Table B-3 it appears that more misdemeanor cases are tried in the city and county courts than in the district courts, although this does not apply to liquor cases. Traffic offenses and bad checks form a high percentage of the misdemeanor cases in the city and county courts.

The average time from filing to trial, in both civil and criminal cases, is much less in the city and county courts than in the district courts.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK OF THE SUPREME COURT

The following is a summary of the work of the supreme court for the year ending June 30, 1943, and of cases pending July 1, 1943:

There were 290 appealed civil cases disposed of within the year ending June 30, 1943. Of these, 72 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 218 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed. Of these cases, 115 were affirmed, 79 reversed, 2 modified, 8 affirmed in part and reversed in part, 4 affirmed in part and modified in part, and 10 were dismissed.

The court also disposed of 28 appealed criminal cases. Of this number 14 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 14 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed. Of this number, 9 were affirmed, 4 reversed, and 1 dismissed.

The court also disposed of 35 original cases. Of this number, 17 were dismissed before having been presented on the merits, and 16 cases were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed, resulting in judgment for plaintiff in 5 cases and for defendant in 11 cases. In addition 2 disbarment cases were submitted on the merits but no opinions filed.

This makes a total of 353 cases disposed of by the supreme court, of which 103 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits; 248 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed, and 2 disbarment cases were submitted on the merits in which judgment was rendered but no opinions were filed.

The cases pending July 1, 1943, were as follows: 92 appealed civil cases, 11 appealed criminal cases, and 6 original cases, making a total of 109 cases.

Of the 248 cases submitted to the supreme court on the merits and in which written opinions were filed, in 12 cases the opinions were filed before the first regular opinion day, in 218 cases on the first regular opinion day, in 15 cases on the second regular opinion day, and in 3 cases on the third regular opinion day. The regular opinion day ordinarily is a month after the case is submitted; more accurately it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In the 218 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1943, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this court and the date the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: within 3 months, 25 cases; in 3 to 4 months, 55 cases; in 4 to 5 months, 34

cases; in 5 to 6 months, 23 cases; in 6 to 7 months, 24 cases; in 7 to 8 months, 23 cases; in 8 to 9 months, 8 cases; in 9 months to 1 year, 16 cases; and over 12 months, 10 cases.

In the 19 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1943, the time between the date the notice of appeal was filed in the supreme court and the date the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: within 3 months, 3 cases; in 4 to 5 months, 3 cases; in 5 to 6 months, 2 cases; in 6 to 7 months, 2 cases; in 7 to 10 months, 2 cases; in 10 months to 1 year, 2 cases.

In the year ending June 30, 1943, the court disposed of 489 motions, of which 446, or 91 percent, were disposed of in 30 days; average time, 9 days.

There were pending in the supreme court July 1, 1943, a total of 109 cases compared with 175 cases on the same date in 1942, 144 in 1941, 192 in 1940, 249 in 1939, 244 in 1938, 210 in 1937, 268 in 1936, 291 in 1935, 366 in 1934, 333 in 1933, 357 in 1932, 393 in 1931, 397 in 1930, 376 in 1929, and 341 in 1928.

In the 16 years the clerk of the supreme court has furnished us detailed information of the work of that court, it has disposed of 8,341 cases, of which 2,663 were dismissed before final submission, and 5,678 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
