---





## NEW MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL



DALE M. BRYANT



ROBERT W. COBEAN

Dale M. Bryant is an ex officio member of the Judicial Council by reason of his being the chairman of the judiciary committee of the house of representatives of the state legislature. Mr. Bryant is a native of Linn county, Kansas. He was graduated from Washburn Law School in June, 1926, and in the same month was admitted to the Bar of the supreme court. Immediately after his admission, he commenced the practice of law in Wichita, where he has since remained. First elected to the house of representatives in 1941, Mr. Bryant has served continuously since that time with great credit to himself and the district which he represents. He has been active in matters with which the Judicial Council is concerned, and has greatly assisted with its program in the legislature.

Robert W. Cobean, who was appointed to the Judicial Council by the chief justice of the supreme court in 1947, is a native of Wellington, Kan., where he obtained his preliminary education. He was graduated from Washburn College and from Washburn Law School. After being admitted to the Bar in 1935, he commenced the practice of law in Wellington. In 1939 he was elected probate judge of Sumner county and served two terms. During that time he served one year as president of the Kansas Probate Judges' Association. In 1943 he was elected county attorney of Sumner county, a position he still holds. At the present time he is president of the Kansas County Attorneys' Association. Mr. Cobean has had an experience which well fits him for duty on the Judicial Council, and the Council welcomes him to its membership.

## Social Security for All Under the Law

Through the generosity of the Judicial Council, I take this opportunity to discuss a matter we often hear mentioned in and out of the legal profession. What I write reflects a personal view. I do not assume to speak for the Bar Association or anyone except myself.

All members of the legal profession will agree that the end and purpose of the law is to guide and govern people in their relations with each other so that they may live together in organized society without serious clash. "Liberty under law" is a familiar phrase to lawyers. It suggests that men may have individual liberties to go about their normal affairs as freely as they choose so long as they do not unduly oppress the other members of society. It is the function of the law to determine when the exercise of individual liberty is going beyond the proper bounds and then to declare the rights of all concerned, including society.

We recognize, whether we like it or not, that we are living in an era of "blocks" and "groups" who have organized and associated themselves together to give weight and driving power to obtain their demands for material advantage at the expense of society. These pressure groups have no respect for the rights of society, or fellows, who are not members of their group. They think only of the benefits and gains for the group with which they have identified themselves. They think not of the losses in individual independence and self reliance. Time alone will disclose an accurate appraisement of the gains and losses and then furnish a true balance as a result of these trends.

Not a few people are asking these questions:

Why does not the Bar Association of the state of Kansas speak out boldly in opposition to these trends?

Why do not lawyers step out in front and assume leadership in the moulding of public opinion against these trends?

Of course the answer is clear. The questions are asked by those who would like to have the Bar Association take up and lead according to their own particular views.

The legal profession and the Bar Association of the state of Kansas are made up, as they should be, of men of widely differing political and economic faiths. Lawyers meet in annual meetings as lawyers and not as members of a political party. The Bar Association is voluntary. A lawyer has a right to belong or not to belong, as he may choose. Individually or in groups the lawyers as good citizens think, act and vote as they please. They advocate such views as they see fit, but they do not try to force their views on the legal profession, through asking the Bar Association to champion either side in any cause which is political or partisan in character.

The legal profession and the members of the Bar Association do have a common interest in all matters which affect the administration of justice. If we preserve free government here, we must make free government, good government. Nowhere does government touch the life of all the people and furnish social security for all, than in the administration of justice, and nowhere is it more important that it be tempered with common sense. While lawyers

refuse to surrender their honest opinions to clients or to the Bar Association, they hold in common that this must be a government of law and not of men, and will always be faithful to the fundamentals of democratic principles, so that all will continue to have the priceless right to go about in their normal affairs freely, as they choose, so long as they do not unduly oppress their neighbors, and if there be oppression, then that the law should come in promptly and define and declare the rights of all affected or concerned.

Wars have always been followed by days of confusion. Civilization never stands still and it is always on the move. The law must and does move with it. New ways will be found to offset the movements of the selfish groups, for every wrong there is a remedy. Under our form of government the rules of procedure are prescribed by the legislative bodies who come from the people. The remedy may seem slow, but justice will soon triumph and prevail.

The era of block and group movements will eventually end. No one can pierce the veil and predict with certainty just how far they will go, but society may rest assured and be secured in the thought that the courts are the one institution of democracy which has been entrusted with the protection and preservation of the rights of all. The Bar Association, through its members, and the legal profession as a whole, will concentrate as a unit to render greater public service in these times of need. The individual lawyer will be found fighting for the rights of his client; the Bar Association for the public as its client, to the end that all our people as whole may continue to live together in organized society without conflict. This is social security for all under the law and the kind which has made our country great.

### Changes in Statistical Tables

On account of our limited printing budget, we have been compelled to condense the statistical tables printed in this issue. We have compiled statistical tables showing the work of the various courts, for the year ending June 30, 1947, in the same form as was printed last year (October, 1946, BULLETIN). These tables are on file in office, available for examination by all who may be interested, but have printed only the more important parts in this BULLETIN.

We have printed the twenty-year summary of the work of the Supreme Court, but have omitted the detailed summary and the table showing disposition of appealed cases.

We have included Table A-1, The Roster of Judicial Officials, and also the greater part of Table A-2, the summary of district courts by districts.

We have combined Tables A-3 and A-4 showing disposition of divorce cases and other civil cases in the district courts, giving only the high spots of each.

Last year we added a new table A-5 showing the types of civil cases commenced in the district courts. We have retained this table, but only for the state as a whole, and have set up the 1946 and 1947 figures in separate columns, for comparative purposes.

Table B-1 showing criminal cases in the district courts, has been retained but condensed.

Table B-2 has been combined with D-1 to include both civil and criminal cases in city and county courts.

Table C-1, which shows all types of business in the probate courts, has been printed intact, but Tables C-2 and C-3, showing details of estates and guardianships, have been omitted.

Our shortage in printing allowance has been partly due to the fact that we printed the entire Probate Code and related statutes, with amendments and annotations to date, in the July, 1947, BULLETIN. From the number of requests for copies of the July BULLETIN, we believe such publication met a general demand and was well justified, even though it has required us to condense our statistical tables.

### Comment on Statistical Tables

The statistical year ending June 30, 1947, shows a moderate but well defined change in the trend of business in our courts. Divorce cases and probate business have declined, but other types of litigation show an increase, thus reversing the trend of the war years.

#### SUPREME COURT

There were more cases in the Supreme Court, where litigation hit an all-time low in 1945. The totals still fall short of the number of cases in the early 1930's, but there is a definite increase.

#### DISTRICT COURTS

In the district courts fewer civil cases have been commenced and more have been terminated (Table A-2) than in the preceding year. An analysis of these figures shows the decline has been only in divorce cases, which dropped from 13,472 to 10,247 (cases commenced), a decline of 3,225, while the total number of cases declined from 22,301 to 19,788, or only 2,513, and there was an increase of 712 in filings of civil cases other than divorce. Table A-5 shows that this increase was principally in suits for the recovery of money and for damages. Foreclosure suits remain at the same low ebb and there is only a slight increase in suits to quiet title.

Tables A-3 and A-4 show the same trends in civil cases disposed of. More divorce cases were dismissed and the number of divorces granted fell from 8,911 to 7,347, a decline of 1,564 or about 17½ percent. In other civil cases disposed of, there was an increase from 7,816 (excluding foreign transcripts) to 9,994, an increase of about 22 percent.

In the district courts, there was an increase in the number of criminal cases filed from 2,034 to 2,138 and in the number terminated from 1,694 to 1,997, over the figures for the preceding year, another reversal of the trend of the war years.

#### PROBATE COURTS

For the first time since the enactment of the Probate Code, probate business shows a decline. The number of new estates opened was 4,408 compared with 4,723 in the preceding year, and the number of new guardianships was 1,221 compared with 1,340 in the year before. The number of descent proceedings dropped from 4,601 in 1946 to 3,765 in 1947. There was a like decline in juvenile cases but an increase in insanity cases, while adoptions and trusts showed little change.

However there was a decided tendency to close up old estates and the number closed increased from 4,177 in 1946 to 4,690 in 1947. However, fewer guardianships were closed than in the preceding year.

#### CITY AND COUNTY COURTS

Civil cases in county courts increased from 688 in 1946 to 897 in 1947. Criminal cases increased from 2,320 to 3,176. This increase is only partially accounted for by the creation of four new county courts in Barber, Norton, Sheridan and Smith counties, which have not previously reported.

In the city courts there has been little change. The number of civil cases in 1946 was 4,947, in 1947, 4,888.

There were 3,388 criminal cases in 1946 and 3,176 in 1947. One new city court, reporting for the first time, is located in Independence.

#### GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

The business of our courts appears to be reverting slowly to its prewar status, but not yet to the conditions prevailing during the depression period. If such conditions return we may expect a further increase in criminal prosecutions, and a great wave of suits for the recovery of money, replevin, and foreclosures, the latter of which are almost negligible. Our judicial system appears to be handling its work with efficiency and dispatch and can carry an increased load whenever necessary.
