

## A Brief for the Bar Association

Justice Walter G. Thiele, chairman of the Judicial Council, in accordance with the established custom, was kind enough to call and ask me to write an article to be published in the JUDICIAL COUNCIL BULLETIN and my first problem was to choose a subject for the article. Inasmuch as I am writing as president of the association it seemed fitting I should write something that pertained to the affairs of that organization.

I have been an officer and member of the executive council of the Kansas Bar Association for many years and have also attended many meetings of the American Bar Association. Having just returned from the Boston meeting of the American Bar Association, it occurred to me that a discussion of the duties and responsibilities of lawyers in supporting their bar association might be of some value and interest to the lawyers and it might result in renewed efforts for the good of the association. Any lawyer who takes an active interest in bar association work realizes that it takes much time and involves some expense to really accomplish any worth-while results in the interests of the association.

It is recognized by lawyers and laity alike that lawyers are generally expected to contribute time, effort and money in the interests of the public welfare, and the record of the lawyers in these instances, I am happy to say, is outstanding in comparison with other similar groups. There is no other organized group of which its members give so freely of their time and money in the interest of the public welfare as the lawyers. In my judgment, however, the lawyers who are willing to work in the public interests, without remuneration, gain much personally through their efforts even though such efforts are given unselfishly.

As president of the Kansas Bar Association I now fully appreciate how much work is required to perform the duties of that office. It was amazing and extremely gratifying to note the response that came from the lawyers over the state who were asked to serve on committees and to do other work of the association and we are looking forward to a most profitable midyear meeting of the committees in Wichita in October.

The idea of the midyear meeting was not new but President Beryl Johnson organized the Kansas Bar for the first meeting, and the response was so outstanding that it is to be held again this year. I sincerely hope that the committee members and any other lawyer who is interested will attend this one-day meeting and assist in planning and carrying on the work of the association.

We well recall the discussion in the executive council meeting concerning the advisability of increasing the dues to the bar association and several members of the council expressed an opinion that many lawyers would give up their membership and that our association would be less effective. Even the members who contended that increasing the dues would strengthen the association were not farsighted enough to see the excellent and almost unbelievabe results. We have more members in the association this year than ever before in the history of the organization. We have established a centrally located office

in Topeka and have in charge of that office Mr. John W. Shuart, a very able, capable and hard-working executive secretary. The number of letters, telephone calls and contacts to this office by the lawyers of Kansas is truly amazing.

The committees of the association have been and are now functioning in an excellent manner. If time and space permitted I would like to discuss the work done by each committee of the association. However, I wish to mention the committee on public relations, of which Judge Clark A. Wallace, of Kingman, has been chairman since the committee was created and funds were appropriated to carry on its work. This was done at a Wichita meeting several years ago by vote of the members.

Judge Wallace, and his committee, have had no easy task and they have performed splendidly and sometimes have been criticized harshly by members of the association but the results of the efforts of this committee are now appearing and in my opinion will prove of great value. No doubt this committee has made some mistakes in some of their efforts, particularly with regard to some of the pamphlets, but any committee that has accomplished what this committee has accomplished in a comparatively short time is bound to make some mistakes, but these mistakes, I am happy to say, are in my judgment greatly overshadowed by the good results.

The American Bar Association appreciates the real value of public relations and has appropriated and spent thousands of dollars in this work.

An opportunity was given me to sit in the House of Delegates while attending the meeting in Boston and great was my surprise at the amount of work that is done there on behalf of the lawyers by the American Bar Association. The stand against communism, taken by the House of Delegates, at this meeting has been generally well received by lawyers and laymen alike and has helped to awaken public sentiment against this danger to our system of government.

Many of the laity have stated to me that they followed the proceedings of the American Bar Association meeting in Boston by radio and by reading newspaper articles. I did not realize how interested people generally are in giving attention to the thinking of lawyers, as expressed at their organized meeting.

I am very pleased that in many cases folks expressed much appreciation of the attitude taken by the lawyers in the meeting at Boston. In some instances people mentioned what was said at the meetings, and these people were persons whom I would never have believed would have paid the least attention to such things. It was gratifying that there were so many Kansas lawyers at the Boston meeting, and I honestly believe that any lawyer who attends a meeting of the American Bar Association benefits greatly thereby and the time and money is well spent.

In the opening meeting of the conference of bar presidents there were forty-four bar presidents in attendance, which seemed to be quite remarkable since the conference of bar presidents is comparatively new. It was refreshing to note the questions that were raised and discussed and the interest which was shown in the discussions.

This is the age of organization but the American Bar Association was organized in 1876 and the Kansas Bar Association was organized in 1883, and both organizations have grown stronger with the years and are now able to render a real service.

If any of you should take the time to read these remarks you will probably immediately wonder why they have been written, and that requires an explanation.

Bar Association work has always interested me and I have tried to do my part in it and it is difficult to understand why any lawyer who is engaged in the practice in this state would not take an interest in the association work and at least be a member of it.

Lawyers generally, and this includes the younger members of the bar, some of whom claim they have yet to establish a remunerative practice, cannot afford to neglect the association, which is doing so much for its members. Some lawyers contend they cannot afford to pay the annual dues and to attend the meetings, and in my judgment a lawyer who feels he cannot afford to support his own organization, even by becoming a member, is stepping over dollars to pick up pennies. Lawyers naturally associate with each other in legal work, particularly lawsuits, and it is only good common sense to conclude that a lawyer who has occasion to refer law business to a lawyer in a neighboring city or county will forward such business to an attorney with whom he is acquainted and in whom he has confidence that the business will be handled promptly and successfully for the client. It is reasonable to believe that every member of the association can recall some business that came to his office through association with other lawyers at a meeting of the bar association.

It might be argued that if every lawyer in Kansas belonged to the association this argument for membership would not be logically sound but nevertheless wide acquaintanceship with other lawyers is a valuable asset and can be gained best through active participation in the affairs of the lawyers' various associations. Furthermore, there are so many questions that are important to lawyers that can only be solved by the lawyers working harmoniously together, by rule of the majority.

From the selfish viewpoint of the lawyer, membership in the association is very valuable and there is no logical line of reasoning to explain why a practicing lawyer should not belong to and actively support his own bar association.

This year a committee of the Kansas Bar Association has been appointed to work with a committee of realtors and also with a committee of trust bankers, and I believe much good can be accomplished by these two committees. The realtors are now organized and licensed and undoubtedly some of the practices that have been detrimental to the interests of lawyers will be eliminated. Too often bankers and real estate men, without qualifications, are engaged in practicing law, even though they are not licensed to do so. In many instances this results in some good business for the lawyers but also in many instances the lawyers are blamed for mistakes which they did not make and which they are called upon to correct.

The bound volume of Title Standards, recently prepared and delivered to the members of the association, has met with a very favorable reaction from the lawyers. The results of this committee's work alone is worth the cost of the membership in the association. Franklin Corrick, editor in chief of our *Kansas Bar Journal*, is doing a very fine work for the lawyers and it is generally conceded that our bar journal is one of the best published. The journal alone is worth more than the annual dues to the association.

Since we have not been able to secure an integrated bar in Kansas it seems worth-while to point out the benefits of voluntary memberships in the association, and if this article will induce more lawyers to become members the results justify the effort expended.

In conclusion, it is an honor and a privilege to be president of as fine an organization as the Kansas Bar Association and every lawyer in the state should be proud of his profession and consider it a privilege to belong to the association and it should never be necessary to solicit a lawyer to join. It has been said that one can not lift himself by his own bootstraps, but this impossible feat can be accomplished by Kansas lawyers who will become active members of the Kansas Bar Association.

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### Summary of the Work of the Supreme Court

The following is a summary of the work of the Supreme Court for the year ending June 30, 1953, and of cases pending July 1, 1953.

There were 291 appealed civil cases disposed of within the year ended June 30, 1953. Of these 96 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 195 were submitted on the merits. Of these cases, 127 were affirmed, 46 reversed, and 1 modified. Eight were affirmed in part and reversed in part. One was affirmed in part and modified in part and 3 cases were reversed in part and modified in part. Nine were dismissed.

The court also disposed of 48 appealed criminal cases. Of this number 13 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 30 were submitted on the merits, and of these cases, 24 were affirmed, 5 reversed, and 1 was affirmed in part and reversed in part.

The court also disposed of 33 original cases. Of this number 11 were dismissed before having been presented on the merits, and 22 cases were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed, resulting in judgment for the plaintiff in 14 cases and for the defendant in 8 cases.

This makes a total of 367 cases disposed of by the Supreme Court, of which 120 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 247 decided on the merits.

The cases pending July 1, 1953, are as follows: 165 appealed civil cases, 18 appealed criminal cases and 9 original cases, making a total of 192 cases pending.

Of the 247 cases submitted to the Supreme Court on the merits, in 11 cases the opinions were filed before the regular opinion day, in 222 cases on the first regular opinion day, in 12 cases on the second regular opinion day, in 1 case on the third regular opinion day, and in 1 case on the fourth regular opinion day.

The regular opinion day ordinarily is a month after the case is submitted; more accurately it is Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In 195 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ended June 30, 1953, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this court and the date the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: Within 3 months, 7 cases; in 3 to 4 months, 3 cases; in 4 to 5 months, 20 cases;

in 5 to 6 months, 4 cases; in 6 to 7 months, 21 cases; in 7 to 8 months, 45 cases; in 8 to 9 months, 51 cases; in 9 to 12 months, 83 cases; and over 12 months, 11 cases.

In 30 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed within the year ended June 30, 1953, the time between the date of notice of appeal was filed in the Supreme Court and the date of the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: Within 3 months, no cases; in 3 to 4 months, no cases; in 4 to 5 months, 2 cases; in 5 to 6 months, 4 cases; in 6 to 7 months, 6 cases; in 7 to 8 months, 6 cases; in 8 to 9 months, 3 cases; in 9 to 12 months, 4 cases; over 12 months, 5 cases.

There were pending in the Supreme Court July 1, 1953, a total of 192 cases compared to 223 on the same date in 1952, 99 on the same date in 1951, 189 on the same date in 1950, 166 cases on the same date in 1949, 208 cases in 1948, 167 cases in 1947, 119 cases in 1946, 123 cases in 1945, 99 cases in 1944, 109 cases in 1943, 175 cases in 1942, 144 cases in 1941, 192 cases in 1940, 249 cases in 1939, 244 cases in 1938, 210 cases in 1937, 268 cases in 1936, 291 cases in 1935, 366 cases in 1934, 333 cases in 1933, 357 cases in 1932, 393 cases in 1931, 397 cases in 1930, 376 cases in 1929 and 341 cases in 1928.

In the 26 years the clerk of the Supreme Court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the court, it has disposed of 11,441 cases, of which 3,588 were dismissed before final submission, and 7,853 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
