Foreword

The Honorable Joe F. Balch, President of the Kansas Bar Association, has been requested to prepare an article on a subject of his choosing for publication in this issue of the COUNCIL BULLETIN. He has done so, and we believe his article will be of particular interest to attorneys throughout the state. It is entitled "Specialization in the Legal Profession: Its Recognition and Certification."

Joe F. Balch of Chanute, Kansas, son of the late O. M. Balch, a member of the Kansas legislature (1933-35), was born in Chanute February 26, 1913. He attended public schools in Chanute, and was a member of the state champion Chanute High School debate team in 1927. He attended the University of Kansas from 1929 to 1933, then Washburn Law School where his LL. B. degree was conferred upon him in 1935. He was a member of Alpha Tau Omega social fraternity. In 1935 he began the practice of law in Chanute with the late John J. Jones. Later in the year 1936 he opened his own law office, and subsequently in 1948 formed his present partnership with Robert L. Briley.

Mr. Balch served as City Attorney of Chanute from 1938 to 1951; was a member of the Kansas legislature in 1943, and served in the United States Navy as a Lt. (j. g.) from 1943 to 1946.

He is a member of the Episcopal Church and is presently serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Diocese of Kansas. He is also a member of the Rotary Club of Chanute (past president); the American Legion (past commander); Neosho County Bar Association (past president); Seventh Judicial District Bar Association (past president); the Kansas Bar Association (member of the executive council 1956-65); and of the American Bar Association (member of the House of Delegates 1962-64). In the year 1963 Mr. Balch was a representative of the American Bar Association to the New Zealand Law Conference. He is presently a director of the Bank of Commerce in Chanute.

He is married to the former Ruth Carpenter, Paola, a classmate at K. U. He has two daughters: Barbara (Mrs. William R. Treloggen, Denver) and Sally (Senior at Sophie Newcomb College of Tulane University).

This issue of the BULLETIN also contains summarized tables showing the volume of work in the Supreme Court, the district courts, probate courts, county and city courts of the state for the year ending June 30, 1967.

Specialization in the Legal Profession: Its Recognition and Certification

For the past fifteen years or so there has been an increasing concern with specialization in the legal profession. In the larger cities, and particularly within their large firms, specialization has become a fact. The question, then, is whether the organized profession should take special cognizance of this fact.

As far back as 1954 the American Bar Association went on record as approving in principle the recognition of voluntary specialization within the profession, and delegated to its Board of Governors the responsibility for developing a plan for certification of competence. Two attempts, in 1954 and in 1962, have failed. Conditions in the legal profession do not remain static. The complexity of governmental regulations and the proliferation of legal sources are often frightening. In the light of this increasing complexity and the exigencies of the practice, the matter will not be permitted to remain dormant and unattacked. The 1967 meeting of the House of Delegates, in Honolulu, again gave the Board of Governors authority to develop a definite plan for establishing specialist qualifications.

As a general practitioner, and because of my interest in matters of concern to the organized bar, I sought to acquaint myself with the arguments on both sides of the subject. I found a prime source to be The American Bar Foundation's publication by Glenn Greenwood and Robert F. Frederickson, "Specialization in the Medical and Legal Professions," Mundelein, Illinois: Callaghan & Company, 1964. Much of the material which follows is a summary of portions of that publication. I hope you, as a member of the profession, will find it as stimulating and provocative as I did.

A "specialist" and an "expert" are not necessarily synonymous. One can devote a great deal of time to an area and yet not be an expert in it; similarly, one can be very proficient in a particular task and yet devote relatively little time to it. In the medical profession, the public often thinks of a specialist as a physician who limits his practice and is *also* an expert in his field of limitation. This view has resulted partly from the system established in the medical profession whereby specialists are examined and certified. In our profession no such system exists.

Attempts to define the word "specialty" are troublesome. In the legal profession, various fields or aspects of the practice, such as trial work, have, in general usage, been deemed "specialties" for any one or more of the following reasons: (a) Few lawyers practice in the field; (b) The majority of lawyers know relatively little about the field; (c) Most of the lawyers who practice in the field devote a great deal of time to it; (d) The field has become an area of concern; and (e) The field contains principles different from other fields of law. A particular area of law practice may qualify as a "specialty" under some of these criteria but not under the others. And, under some of the criteria, an area of law practice may be deemed a "specialty" and yet the lawyers who practice in that area might not be "specialists."

Although specialization within the profession already exists and will increase, is it desirable that it be officially recognized?

Proponents of official recognition and certification of specialists argue that such recognition will be beneficial to general practitioners, since general practitioners who encounter complex problems in a specialty field will then be more easily able to locate competent experts either in the vicinity or in other

parts of the country. Those who disagree argue that general practitioners presently do not have difficulty in finding qualified specialists, and even if specialists were officially approved, general practitioners would not choose a lawyer in a distant community solely on the basis of his certification. Many practitioners in rural areas feel that the conditions under which they represent clients are considerably different from those in large cities, so that most small-town lawyers have no choice but to remain "general practitioners."

Some lawyers who are now generally considered by the public and members of the profession to be "specialists" fear that, if a plan for official recognition is instituted, they will have to become certified in order to keep up their prestige. Others argue that many of the present-day "self-styled" specialists are not really experts, and that one of the major reasons for instituting a plan of official recognition would be to protect the public from such "specialists." One widely advocated proposal is to include within the recognition plan a "grandfather's clause," which would automatically give approved status to practitioners currently practicing within particular specialties. However, many lawyers do not favor including such a clause since they feel it would not protect the public from unqualified lawyers who claim to be specialists exclusively by virtue of the fact that they have handled a number of cases in a particular field.

Some present-day specialists argue that they have spent years persuading the public and the bar that they are "lawyers," in the usual and more general sense of the word, and if a system of certification were introduced, they would be explicitly labeled "corporation lawyers" or "tax lawyers," and their prestige would suffer because these terms imply a lack of knowledge in other fields. Those who favor official recognition assert that these specialists are given such labels whether they are officially certified or not, and in any event the labels would not cause a loss of prestige if the lawyers were officially certified.

Some proponents of official recognition of specialists believe that it is necessary for lawyers who are specialists to be able to indicate to the public and other lawyers that they are specialists in order to compete with lay personnel who are experts in specialty fields. On the other hand, some lawyers fear that the privilege of being certified would be abused by those who merely want to use the privilege for advertising.

Some lawyers fear that a system of recognition of specialists would benefit lawyers in large law firms but would be detrimental to those in small firms and to individual practitioners. They argue that only a large law firm would have enough clients with problems in a specialty field to be able to afford to specialize. Opponents of this view maintain that official recognition would help a lawyer to establish a specialized practice in a small firm or as an individual practitioner. They contend that nowadays clients who have problems in specialized fields automatically go to a large firm for specialized help, but they would look for a specialist in any type of firm, small or large, if they knew he was certified.

Some lawyers contend that a system of official recognition would greatly benefit the public because it would encourage lawyers to improve their skills and capacities by taking additional training. However, others argue that this advantage would be far outweighed by the disadvantage that official recognition would encourage specialization to such an extent that the profession would eventually consist almost entirely of specialists. They assert

that this is happening in the medical profession, where it is sometimes difficult to find a general practitioner who will make personal calls and give general examinations.

There have been complaints by clients that there is no easy method of finding legal specialists. Proponents of official recognition argue that certification would solve this problem. They assert that one of the major reasons that lawyers have been prohibited by the Canons of Ethics from listing their specialties in sources generally available to the public (such as classified telephone directories) is the fear that lawyers making such listings would not in fact be experts in the fields they designated, and that a system of official recognition would allow only certified specialists to list their specialties, and the reasons for the prohibition against such listings would disappear. Some who disagree with this view state that there is another reason for the prohibition: it serves to prevent lawyers from advertising; and that such prohibitions should remain in force whether specialists are officially recognized or not, and the disadvantage to the public in not being able to find a specialist is outweighed by the advantage to the profession. Others point out that, in the usual situation, the public would not be benefited by a readily available listing of specialties, because the ordinary layman does not know what kind of a lawyer he needs.

It is contended by some members of the bar that the specialty organizations growing up within the legal profession are pulling lawyers who practice in special fields away from the American Bar Association, and that unless affirmative action is taken by the association to regulate and control specialists the specialty organizations will divide the profession into splinter groups.

A major problem which would face any proposal is that of classification; that is, determining what fields should be considered specialties. Should a plan concern only those who specialize according to subject matter (taxation, corporate law, etc.) or should it also concern those who specialize according to function? Should a lawyer who litigates personal injury cases exclusively be deemed a specialist in advocacy or in tort law?

Another problem is that of determining the qualifications that would be required of a lawyer before he could be certified as a specialist. Since protection of the public from unqualified lawyers who hold themselves out as specialists is a prime consideration, the answer may depend in part upon the expectations of the lay public with respect to the "specialist." If the public merely interprets the word as most dictionaries define it, that is, as a person who devotes himself to a single subject, then perhaps a simple requirement that the certified lawyer spend a certain amount of time working in the specialty is all that is necessary; however, if the public assumes that a specialist is also an expert, other requirements might also be needed. There is a full scale of alternatives, ranging from minimal requirements to very strict qualifications.

Some lawyers believe that if a plan of official recognition of specialists is instituted, an examination should be given to all candidates desiring to be officially recognized. If it is decided that an examination system should be imposed, then the questions arise as to whether each state should administer its own examination or whether, to achieve uniformity, a national examination should be given.

Some lawyers who are opposed to examinations feel that a better alternative

might be to institute a system whereby a centralized agency would accredit schools offering specialization programs. Completion of the school's required course of study would then be deemed sufficient to entitle the student to official recognition. Others feel that a candidate desiring recognition as a specialist should merely be required to show that he has spent a sufficient amount of time handling cases in that specialty.

If the standards for certification are too high, there will be objections that those running the system are motivated by self-interest; if the standards are too low, official recognition will have little meaning. And of course a problem which must be considered in any plan is whether to include a "grandfather's clause" giving approved status to those currently practicing the specialty. Once a candidate has fulfilled the requirements and becomes officially recognized, the question arises as to whether additional requirements should be imposed on him to insure that he keeps up-to-date in his field.

A problem also arises as to the special privileges that should be granted to certified specialists—whether they should be able to place a certificate of qualification on their walls, list their names in approved directories of legal specialists, or list their specialties in such media as classified telephone directories, professional cards, letterheads, and shingles.

Should certified specialists be required to limit their practice to the specialty? Should non-specialists be permitted to practice in the specialized fields? Should the certification plan provide that a certified specialist must confine his practice to advising general practitioners? Should the profession set limits on the number of specialists it will certify? Will a lawyer denied certification have any remedy either within or without the governing authority? These, and other problems, certainly would have to be considered under any plan of official recognition.

Your Kansas Bar Association will be watching with interest and concern the efforts of the Bar to define and to cope with the matters of specialization.

Summary of the Work of the Supreme Court

The following is a summary of the work of the Supreme Court for the year ending June 30, 1967, and the cases pending July 1, 1967.

The Supreme Court disposed of 336 cases during the year. Included in the total terminated by the court were 198 appealed civil cases, 86 appealed criminal cases and 52 original cases.

Of the total civil appeals, 109 were affirmed, 44 were reversed, 32 dismissed, 11 affirmed in part and reversed in part, 1 affirmed as modified and 1 affirmed with directions.

Of the appealed criminal cases 45 were affirmed, 11 were reversed, 27 dismissed, 1 affirmed in part and reversed in part, and 1 appeal sustained.

Judgment was for the plaintiff in 9 original cases and for the defendant in 37 others. The court dismissed 6 original cases.

The Supreme Court also issued 775 orders prior to final disposition of cases pending during the year and in addition ruled upon 62 post-decision motions.

During the year 17 civil appeals were also docketed in the Supreme Court under Rule No. 6 (j). In such cases, 9 applications for intermediate orders were granted; 8 were denied. In 3 cases, the regular appeal was later docketed and in 14 cases the appeal was either pending or terminated in the district court.

There were 9 applications for permission to take interlocutory appeals (Rule 5) filed in the Supreme Court, 8 of which were denied, and 1 was allowed.

Pending in the Supreme Court as of July 1, 1967, were 292 cases, of which 193 were appealed civil cases, 78 appealed criminal cases and 21 original cases. The average number of cases pending on July 1, for the past ten years, is 300.

During the year ending June 30, 1967, opinions were filed in 278 cases terminated by the Court. In 220 cases opinions were filed on or before the first regular opinion day; in 11 cases on or before the second regular opinion day; and in 1 case after the fourth regular opinion day. 46 cases were decided on the day they were submitted.

The regular opinion day is ordinarily a month after the case is submitted, more accurately it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In the 173 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1967, the time between the date the case was docketed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within three months, 4 cases; in three to four months, 11 cases; in four to six months, 37 cases; in six to eight months, 33 cases; in eight to ten months, 68 cases; in ten to twelve months, 8 cases; and in over twelve months, 12 cases.

In 59 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed during the year ending June 30, 1967, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within three months, no cases; in three to four months, 1 case; in four to six months, 1 case; in six to eight months, 8 cases; in eight to ten months, 4 cases; in ten to twelve months, 10 cases; and in over twelve months, 35 cases.

In the forty years that the Clerk of the Supreme Court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the Supreme Court, it has disposed of 17,020 cases, of which 5,703 were dismissed before submission, and 11,317 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
