

FOREWORD

The Honorable Robert Martin, President of the Kansas Bar Association, has been requested to prepare an article on a subject of his choosing for publication in this issue of the COUNCIL BULLETIN. He has done so, and we believe his article is timely and should command the attention of the attorneys throughout the state. It is entitled "*What the Bar Should Do About Campus Disorders.*"

Robert Martin was born in Kansas City in 1923 and reared in Kansas City, Kansas, where he graduated from Wyandotte High School.

He attended the University of Kansas with an interruption for service as a pilot in the United States Air Force during World War II. He served overseas with the Second Division of the Eighth Air Force. Following the war he returned to the University of Kansas where he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts in the Spring of 1947. Following graduation he enrolled in the Law School at the University of Colorado, from which he obtained his LL. B. degree in August, 1948.

After graduation he served for approximately one year as law clerk to the Honorable Arthur J. Mellott, United States District Judge for the District of Kansas. He then commenced the practice of law in Western Kansas at Cimarron, where he remained for about one year. In 1950 he went to Wichita to enter the general practice with the law firm of Collins, Williams, Hughes and Martin. He has practiced in Wichita since that date and is presently a member of the law firm of Martin, Porter, Pringle, Schell and Fair.

In 1946 he married Anne Zimmerman. They have three children, a son and a daughter of college age, and a son in high school. Mr. Martin describes his diversions as hunting, polo, skiing and handball.

This issue of the BULLETIN also contains summarized tables showing the volume of work in the Supreme Court, the district courts, probate courts, county and city courts of the state for the year ending June 30, 1970.

What the Bar Should Do About Campus Disorders

“. . . socialists and anarchists of various types have begun to fight over the remains of liberalism. All of them express a profound impatience, a very real contempt for America and its technology. And for the most part, they do not really care how destructive the radicalism is, unless in any given case the author's analysis convinces him that revolution is a poor methodology for producing the desired result.

“But what of the future? At least one thing is clear: the agitation of the left against our institutions and values will certainly persist. There is no reason to think that it will abate, since the left's ideas have already existed for two to three centuries and have shown a very real capacity for spurring men on, both in this country and elsewhere.

“The Bourgeois, now denominated 'the silent majority' in the United States, has never formulated a philosophical, moral rationale which would provide it a defense against the alienated intellectual. It has, instead, just gone on without much of an articulated philosophical base. Such a condition may be able to persist for quite a long while, as it already has. We might, however, except that ultimately it will spell the demise of American civilization as we have known it.”

These unhappy conclusions are expressed in an article titled *What the Businessman Should Know about the “New Left,”*¹ by Professor Dwight D. Murphey of Wichita State University.² Professor Murphey argues that the success of the “acting man” (the capitalist) has alienated and embittered the intellectual who, although once in control of society, has been forced into a secondary position. To fight back, the intellectual community has formed an alliance with minority groups, with whom intellectuals have very little in common except dissatisfaction with the American ideals and way of life. This combination of intellectuals and minority groups stand opposed not just to the “barons of industry,” but to the entire American middle class now labeled “the establishment.”

Obviously, intellectuals (and pseudo-intellectuals) are well represented among the faculty on our college campuses. Anyone who believes that the reaction of the intellectual described by Professor Murphey does not figure heavily in campus disorders has either ignored the facts or taken leave of his senses. It is not by chance that the focal point of intellectual activity and organized violence now coincides on the campus. What is equally clear, and perhaps implied by Professor Murphey, is that an increasing number of students and campus hangers-on are being encouraged or manipulated by so-called intellectuals to act as if they were a disadvantaged minority group. Actually college students cannot logically be grouped as a minority and few, if any, are disadvantaged by their attendance in college.

Most college administrators and faculty members, whether in or outside of the “new left,” will deny that young people are being manipulated into protest and violence. They explain the obvious connection between the intellectual climate of the campus and repeated occurrences of organized protest and

violence as the natural manifestation of a profound concern on the part of students, in particular, and young people, in general. The argument does not bear analysis. Admittedly, college students are, and have always been, idealistic, energetic and venturesome, but never before have they demonstrated an internal capacity for organized, sustained political activity on a national basis. This requires inspiration, planning and leadership from sources outside their own ranks. The source is the alienated intellectual community identified by Professor Murphey.

Perhaps an even better indication that organized violence and protest are not spontaneous with students can be found in the conduct of the extreme radical groups on campus. The militants and "hippie-types" mimic the intellectual. They are preoccupied with badges of intellectualism such as music, art, and "the simple life of contemplation." They abhor materialism and wealth; they prefer "dialogue" to competition or hard work.

That extreme student radicals are led and not leading is also apparent from the fact that in practice they cannot remain true to the causes they claim to support. Many wild-eyed radicals who lecture the establishment about air pollution, surface pollution, ecology and environmental control, continue to pollute and debauch their own bodies with excessive uses of tobacco, alcohol and drugs. They choose to house themselves in overcrowded slums and blighted areas. To commune with nature they assemble in city parks. In short, they select the most unfavorable environment at hand and make it even worse by their presence and their conduct. A glaring inconsistency is that in the cause of peace they commit violence, with or without provocation.

It should go without saying that these remarks are not intended as a general indictment of college faculties or students. The vast majority of both are good citizens who are serious about giving or getting an education. But even so, they are influenced and diverted by the radical element. College administrators, faculties and students have developed a tolerance for civil disorder and a lack of admiration or respect for our country and our political and economic system which could bring about the eventual destruction of both.

As lawyers we are, whether we like it or not, a part of the establishment. Anglo-American jurisprudence, as it has developed through our profession, is the underpinning of the American political and economic system. If the new left is to destroy that system or seriously alter it, then it must deal violently with our profession at the outset. This is precisely why the trial of the Chicago seven became a cause celebre for radicals on many campuses across the country. It is also the reason for the disgusting spectacles staged in criminal trials by militant defendants and their radical lawyers. The situation can no longer be ignored or tolerated by our profession. The establishment must now commence to find ways, within our constitutional and legal framework, to deal with the alienated intellectual and to minimize or counteract his influence upon the younger generations with whom he now seeks an unholy alliance. The place to start, I suggest, is at one of the focal points of trouble—the college campus. The particular place for the organized bar to start is with the law schools.

This year the Kansas Bar Association will have five separate committees working directly with the two Kansas law schools on a variety of projects. Among the specific objectives are the establishment of joint venture arrange-

ments between the Association and the schools to initiate the following programs: (1) An increase in the exposure of students to lectures or seminar programs conducted by skilled, practicing lawyers; (2) Basic skills training to better equip the graduate to practice law; (3) Development of curriculum, faculty and facilities for post-graduate and specialized education in the profession; (4) a new evaluation of standards and examinations for admission to the bar; and (5) Effective education of law students in professional responsibility and ethics.

The overall effect of these programs will be to increase dramatically the direct contact between the practicing bar and the students and faculty of our two law schools. Hopefully, this will provide the profession with the interest as well as the opportunity to become directly involved in the management and development of these schools.

At the same time, the work of some of the committees will begin to provide the Association with answers to some interesting and timely questions, such as:

1. How far are the law schools and the organized bar actually willing to go in joining forces to improve educational processes and the profession?

2. What is the present structure of our law school curricula; that is, what courses are required, what courses are optional, and what courses are not available to law students in Kansas?

3. Are the curricula, overall, in balance between theory and practical education; are they, as some suggest, overbalanced with too much sociological or political emphasis?

4. On what basis and by what organizations are law schools accredited or rated and do those procedures bear a reasonable relationship to the ability of the school to produce graduates who are well equipped for the practice?

5. How are law school professors selected and evaluated before they are employed and specifically, what efforts are made to determine whether candidates have a history of radical activities or other backgrounds which might make them undesirable as teachers of the law?

6. By obtaining a profile of faculty members in each law school, can the bar determine whether there are professors on the staff who, for any reason, ought to be replaced?

7. Under what circumstances and by what procedures can faculty members be discharged or replaced?

8. Are the surroundings, opportunities and compensations offered law school faculty members adequate to attract and retain the kind of men we want and need as teachers of the law?

I am not suggesting a "witch hunt" in our law schools. I am proposing an organized, sustained effort to get our profession (the establishment) directly and seriously involved with the faculty and students of our law schools, to the end that we can understand and evaluate each other and promote jointly the best interests of the profession. I should also make it clear that I do not suggest a mere improvement in communications; the initiation of "dialogue" with nothing more. The profession and the law schools should act upon their conclusions. If our law schools are well managed, well staffed, and not contributing to the current troubles on campus (and troubles there certainly are) then as a profession we should defend the law schools and support them. If the contrary is true, we should first use every persuasion and cooperative effort and, if that fails, every legitimate and fair means at our command to remedy the undesirable conditions, whatever they may be.

One thing is clear, the organized bar has a great stake in our law schools. Poorly educated lawyers downgrade the profession; they may even destroy

it. Law students who have been radicalized or conditioned to react violently or improvidently to disagreements or disappointments will not make cool heads in or out of the courtroom. As counselors, they will be nothing; as trial lawyers they will be worse than nothing.

If this approach can be made to work by the organized bar, then businessmen, engineers, physicians, and other groups in the establishment can follow suit in working with their own schools or sections of our educational institutions. Hopefully, one or a combination of these efforts can establish similar working relationships within the undergraduate and liberal arts schools where, in the opinion of this writer, we will really begin to turn up the seeds of radicalism and deal effectively with the new left on the campus.

The lawyer, the businessman, the physician and alumni of every calling, will have to discard the comfortable notion that if the football team has a winning season and there has not been more than one or two killings and an occasional fire, the affairs of his university are in sufficiently good order that none of his personal time and effort will be required in its management. As Professor Murphey warns: ". . . the agitation of the (new) left against our institutions and values will certainly persist. There is no reason to think it will abate, since the left's ideas have already existed for two to three centuries and have shown a very real capacity for spurring men on (to violence), both in this country and elsewhere."

Summary of the Work of the Supreme Court

The following is a summary of the work of the Supreme Court for the year ending June 30, 1970, and the cases pending July 1, 1970.

The Supreme Court disposed of 345 cases during the year. Included in the total terminated by the Court were 214 appealed civil cases, 80 appealed criminal cases and 51 original cases.

Of the total civil appeals, 123 were affirmed, 47 were reversed, 31 dismissed, 11 affirmed in part and reversed in part, and 2 remanded.

Of the appealed criminal cases, 58 were affirmed, 3 were reversed, 18 dismissed, and 1 remanded.

Of 51 original cases, the Court dismissed 20 cases, entered judgment for plaintiff in 3 cases and for defendant in 28 cases.

The Supreme Court also issued 1,097 orders prior to final disposition of cases pending during the year and in addition ruled upon 61 post-decision motions.

During the year 24 civil appeals were also docketed in the Supreme Court under Rule No. 6 (j). In such cases, 15 applications for intermediate orders were granted, 8 were denied, and 1 was withdrawn. In 18 cases, the regular appeal was later docketed and in 6 cases the appeal was either pending or terminated in the district court.

There were 7 applications for permission to take interlocutory appeals (Rule 5) filed in the Supreme Court, 6 of which were denied, and 1 allowed.

Pending in the Supreme Court as of July 1, 1970, were 360 cases, of which 209 were appealed civil cases, 135 appealed criminal cases and 16 original cases. The average number of cases pending on July 1, for the past ten years is 315.

During the year ending June 30, 1970, opinions were filed in 277 cases terminated by the Court. In 234 cases opinions were filed on or before the first regular opinion day; in 12 cases on or before the second regular opinion day; and in 1 case after the fourth opinion day. 30 cases were decided on the day they were submitted.

The regular opinion day is ordinarily a month after the case is submitted, more accurately, it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In 184 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1970, the time between the day the case was docketed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within three months, 5 cases; in three to four months, 8 cases; in four to six months, 17 cases; in six to eight months, 15 cases; in eight to ten months, 1 case; in ten to twelve months, 8 cases; and in over twelve months, 130 cases.

In 62 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed during the year ending June 30, 1970, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within three months, 1 case; in three to four months, no cases; in four to six months, 2 cases; in six to eight months, no cases; in eight to ten months, no cases; in ten to twelve months, 4 cases; and in over twelve months, 55 cases.

In the forty-three years that the Clerk of the Supreme Court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the Supreme Court, it has disposed of 17,982 cases, of which 5,855 were dismissed before submission, and 12,127 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
